# 2010 Municipal Budget Introduced

The 2010 municipal budget was introduced at Monday night's Borough Council meeting. If passed, residents will see a reduction in the municipal portion of their property tax bill. According to Councilman Ray Rusnak, chairman of the Administrative, Finance and Public Information Committee, a property with an assessed value of \$122,500 will see a decrease of \$178 in their 2010 property taxes from 2009.

Rusnak explained that this year's municipal budget was a huge challenge because of the substantial reduction in state aid. The goal was to find innovative ways to cut spending without cutting services while keeping property taxes flat.

Councilmen Robert Bengivenga, Jr. and Matt Anesh also serve on the finance committee.

The finance committee had additional work this year after voters rejected the proposed Board of Education budget in April. Last week the committee formally recommended cut-

ting the BOE budget by \$1.5M. The council voted unanimously to accept the recommendations.

In January Rusnak asked members of the council to make recommendations on spending curs prior to starting to work on the municipal budget. Soon thereafter the council began implementation of some of the suggestions, including staff reductions, rebidding of the borough recycling contract and refinancing of borough debt. The borough also bonded \$800,000 to help offset the payout of retiring employees. Repayment of those bonds will not be included in this year's budget.

included in this year's budget.

Because this is the borough's first full calendar year budget, it is difficult to compare expenses and income to last year's. Last year's municipal taxes were based on two separate municipal budgets; the first half of 2009 included the final two quarters of the 2008/2009 budget which traditionally is always higher than the first two quarters of 2008; and the second half of 2009 was a six-month budget introduced so that

the borough could move to a calendar fiscal year. In the interest of drawing a comparison Mike English asked CFO Glenn Cullen to provide him with the figures of the last fiscal year budget.

Commenting on the budget, Mayor Charles Butrico said that the finance committee did a great job on keeping taxes down, but added that this year's budget shows an increase of \$1M in spending and asked the committee to keep working on finding spending cuts.

Council President Matt Anesh announced that he is forming a budget committee and asked Councilwoman Chrissy Buteus to serve on it along with members of the finance committee.

The finance committee also announced that they will be holding budget meetings on Wednesday and Thursday, June 9 and 10. The time and place to be announced.

A public hearing on the budget will be held at a special meeting on Monday, June 28 at 7 p.m. in borough hall. Copies of the municipal budget are available in the clerk's office.

# Revised Maps Redefine County's Flood Zones

48 borough properties removed–64 added; Residents are urged to consider insurance

Purchasing insurance while

still technically in a low risk zone will offer property

"orandfathered" status.

Emergency Management Coordinator Mike Zushma has announced that new Middlesex County flood maps will

go into effect on July 6. The good news for South Plainfield property owners is that 48 properties will be removed from the flood zone; the bad news is that 64 properties have been added.

For the past seven years, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) has been revising flood maps across the nation to ensure they reflect new developments, changes in topography, and changes in water pools and flows. The goal is to provide individuals and officials with the most accurate assessment of their risk for flooding, the country's most prevalent natural disaster. The underlying rationale is that when people know their risks, they can work to mitigate them.

Although there is a net loss of over

Although there is a net loss of over 1,100 structures in the county's newly defined flood plain, many towns have substantial increases in the number of properties designated as residing in the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA). South Plainfield residents are urged to check the status of their property on the new map at either the municipal office or online at www.rampp-team.com/nj.htm. Go to the Middle-sex County Flood map, click on the search button on the top right of the page and fill in the property address. Inclusion in a SFHA carries a

Inclusion in a SFHA carries a mandatory flood insurance requirement for all structures with a federally backed mortgage. Homeowners in one of Middlesex County's newly defined flood plains with a mortgage held by a bank with Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) protections will be

required to obtain a flood insurance policy.

To minimize the cost of the insurance, residents are urged to buy flood insurance prior to the revised designations when the new map takes effect on July 6. Doing so will ensure that the insurance premium will reflect the reduced risk for flooding of your location on the current map. Residents who wait until after the new map takes effect will have to pay the full premium associated with risk of being in a newly defined flood plain. Purchasing insurance while still technically in a low risk zone will offer property owners the advantage of a grandfathered" status. This means that although the cost of a one-year flood insurance policy will likely increase each year, you will never be paying as high a rate as you would if you wait until after the new maps goes into effect to purchase flood insurance.

One example of savings by purchasing flood insurance before the map takes effect is as follows: coverage for a \$200,000 structure is \$368 for a preferred risk policy, or \$1,000 for a B,C,X Zone grandfathered structure before the map becomes effective and \$1,764 after the new map takes effect. According to FEMA, private in-

# **BOE Accepts \$1.25M in Cuts, Adopts Budget**

Two days after the Borough Council voted unanimously to recommend cutting \$1.25M from the defeated \$52,299,264 school budget, the BOE approved the council's recommendations and formally adopted the 2010/2011 budget.

The final budget of \$51,149,264 includes \$48,804.444 for the general fund, \$161,700 in grants and entitlements and \$1,182,120 in debt services. The amount raised by taxes is \$39,438,003 in the general fund and \$1,183,120 for debt service. The reduced tax rate of 2.7988 for the 2010/2011 school year will be lower than the 2009/2010 rate of 2.823.

than the 2009/2010 rate of 2.823.
As the 2010/2011 budget was being formulated, the district suffered cuts in state aid and also had its \$1.5M



in 2009/2010 surplus appropriated by Governor Christie. This resulted in drastic cuts in teaching staff and programs in the budget, including the reduction of 33 positions in teachers and teacher aides and a 25% reduction in supplies for all the district schools. The \$1.25M cut will result in

additional reductions in programs. Although the full day kindergarten program initiated for the 2009/2010 school year will continue in the coming school year, two other long term programs-summer school and the adult high school program and its director-have been eliminated in the budget. The director of technology, an administrative position, has also been eliminated. Further reductions are being considered, including the elimination of freshman sports, winter varsity track, competition cheerleading, varsity swimming, fall weight training and the elimination of team leaders in the high school and middle school.

To make up for the \$1.25M reduction, the budget will reflect decreases of \$350,000 from budgeted raises for teachers, school sponsored athletics, secretaries and support services, as well as \$100,000 by eliminating the position of adult school director; \$250,000 savings in health benefits costs by changing to a new health insurance provider; and \$375,000 from a 1.5% employee contribution to health insurance-all amounting to a total of \$1,075,000. The remaining \$175,000 will come from the general fund surplus in the 2010/2011 budget.

The immediate effect of the reduction was the board approval of the withdrawal of \$300,215 from its current expense emergency reserve to meet an increase in total health care costs; the appropriation of \$1,199,785 in excess surplus identified in the audit of June 30 from the 2010/2011 budget; and to use \$175,000 from the general fund surplus in the 2010/2011 budget.

### Dear Editor,

Last week a united Borough Council reduced taxes for homeowners by finding ways to reduce the school board budget which was defeated by the voters in April. Instead of increasing by \$100, residents will now see a \$15 decrease in their school taxes this year. The council's \$1.25M reduction doesn't cut one teacher, nor does it eliminate a single program for our stu-dents. In fact, just the opposite; the council recommended additional ways

to bring teachers and programs back. I want to personally thank the plan's architect, Councilman Ray Rusnak, who heads our finance committee. About a month ago I assigned that committee the responsibility for reviewing the board's budget. I urged the committee to come up with ways to save money that would not take teachers out of the classroom or in any way hurt the students. After many long hours working with Glenn Cullen, our CFO/administrator, and Bob Swisher, our auditor, Rusnak presented a plan that did just that.

I also want to commend the entire council for their teamwork. Rusnak worked hard to make the budget review a bipartisan endeavor. Once the cuts were sketched out, Rusnak reached out to Mayor Butrico who immediately got on board and worked to make sure the others in his party would do the same. The mayor de-

There has been a major change in recycling batteries. Since the chemical composition of certain batteries no longer include mercury or other highly toxic metals, the United States Government now deems them safe to dispose of in the regular trash. The batteries included in this change are the standard AAA, AA, C, D and 9V; therefore, it is no longer necessary to bring them to the library as the borough has removed the battery recycling bin. If you have any other types of batteries that still need to be recycled, you will need to contact the borough's recy-

cling department at (908) 226-7621.

The library will take this opportunity to remind everyone of the rules for computer usage at the library. If you are a resident of South Plainfield, you must have your South Plainfield library card to use a computer. If you do not have a library card you can

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register for one by showing identification with your name and a South Plainfield address. This can be a driver's license, utility bill, rental agreement, or any other official document. If you have lost your library card, you can obtain a replacement by showing identification and paying a \$2 fee. Parents and guardians, please remember that children below the age of 15 are required to have a parent present while they are using a computer. Moreover, is a good time to also remind all adults that the library is a public building and it is impossible for the staff to onitor children. We do not know if a child is leaving with a parent or a stranger, so it is in the best interest of both adults and children that the children not be left

alone while in the library. The library staff is the final stages of training for the new circulation/catalog system that the library is installing. Therefore, the training will require that the library be closed on Tuesday, May Wednesday, May 26 and Thursday, May 27. The system we currently have is quite old and no longer supported by the vendor. The new system we will be installing will be state-of-the-art and have all the applications found in the current system plus much more. ### Library Board Lacks Quorum to Vote on Surplus borough the necessary relief it sought.

The Library Board of Trustees was unable to vote on whether to accept the Borough Council's resolution ask ing the library to return 10% of its \$1.7M surplus (\$170,000) to provide tax relief to the borough at its May 11 meeting because three members were absent

In making the request, the council noted that every department was asked to cut costs by 10%, and "efforts to cut costs should apply to all departments, agencies and boards, includ-ing the library." According to Coun-cilman Ray Rusnak, the library is the only department that has not provided tax relief to the borough.

Acting Chairman and Trustee Cheryl Nagel-Smiley noted that the library board had advanced the borough \$140,000 towards the cost of the re-cent roof replacement. Since the actual cost was approximately \$112,000, the board requested the return of \$27,999, which the council paid. Nagel-Smiley commented that that money was spent on a capital ex-pense, the library has already given the

### Local Businessman Charged With Bribery

Roman Zjawin, 47, a resident of Towaco, was arrested and charged with bribery on May 11 after an investiga-tion conducted by the South Plainfield Police Department.

Inspector Edward Laferrera, an official of the Bureau of Fire Prevention, was conducting a periodic inspection of European Motor Service, located at 2114 Park Ave. for fire code violations. During the inspection Zjawin offered Inspector Laferrera a \$100 dollar bill to avoid being cited for 18 fire code violations. The premises were temporarily closed for various fire and safety violations.

Detective Vincent Campagna was the primary investigator who arrested Zjawin without incident. Bail was set at \$2500, which Zjawin posted.

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"That money [for the roof] is a capital fund. We maintained this building. When we move, the borough has a building in perfect condition," said

Library Director Sundra Randolph noted the \$1.7M surplus was accumulated over 20 years and was never part of the \$1.3M the borough allocates to the library each year by law.

Trustee Kathleen Thomas

"All taxpayer money is spent for salaries and equipment. The surplus is money that has come directly to the library in the form of fines, gifts and grants. We don't use the money we receive in fines as part of our regular budget. That money has been set aside. It's a practice I started since I came here," said Randolph. She added that the governor is reducing library fund-

ing by 74%, from \$14M to \$3.6M. A reduction of this magnitude will impact on matching federal funds. The results of these cuts will do away with many shared inter-library services with no inter-library loans, no books for the blind and disabled, and the loss of Internet access to electronic databases.

A bill is also pending in the assembly that would eliminate the minimum funding requirement for local librar-

ies, leaving the decision to each town. Nagel-Smiley commented on let-ters suggesting alternate spaces for the library, including one suggesting to trade the senior citizen building for the library building, saying that while she appreciated the input, the application to move the library to Montrose Avenue is still pending, and has been continued to Thursday, May 27.




The scholarship is intended to inspire creative students from SPHS and is not limited to graphic design. Its purpose is to encourage students in


