Two councilmen vote against pool penalty; cite public 'negativism,' budget concerns

Correspondent Despite protests from angry adopted an ordinance adding a \$25 late fee for those who haven't paid their pool membership fee by April 15 at its Feb. 28 meeting.

only councilmen Paul Rasmussen and John Pulomena cast "no" votes, listing their primary conresidents, the Borough Council cerns as "negativism" in the community and unclear budget procedures.

"The \$25 late fee added to the-\$175 membership fee would have

enrollment," said Rasmussen. "The negativism is already out there.

Pulomena commended Recreation Department for the successful operation of the pool in 1990, but added that he was worried about unclear revenue and expenditures

The budget is not completed," he said. "We must make sure we have enough revenue to cover the balloon payment in 1992. There was a \$122,000 surplus from the \$500,000 bond sitting there, that is supposed to be used for restoration of the facilities, and \$29,000 has already been taken out that I never agreed to.

"This is not clear to me," Pul-omena said. "We must properly manage or we'll have serious problems in the next few years."

Angry residents wanted to know why the Recreation Department sent out their yearly booklets stating the pool fees before the ordinance was adopted.

In its heyday, the late 1970s and early 1980s, pool membership hovered at about 900 families. Last year, the first year the pool was operated by the borough, 542 families joined, a figure up 25 percent from the year before.

Relocation of German School could cost district \$10G in rent

Senior Reporter The school district may soon lose \$10,000 in annual rental revenues, because a parent/ teacher organization at Riley School wants to use the school on Saturdays for fundraising events.

The German School of Central New Jersey, a private language school that pays the Board of Education \$10,000 annually to use Riley School on ings, has been told they must find a new facility come September.

"It's a shame that we have to leave," said Karen Stroever, a German School volunteer that has been involved in looking into new locations, both in and outside of the South Plainfield school district. "The facility has been won-

The German School has been meeting at Riley School for 17 According to German school officials, they don't want to leave South Plainfield. But they cannot find a suitable spot within the district, and have been considering options in parochial schools and other public school districts.

Riley School Parent The Teacher Student Organization has repreatedly asked the Board of Education to move the German school out. They asked the board to consider not renewing the lease agreement for Riley School last June, and again in October of

"We feel that 17 years is a long enough time to have to bear the burden," said PTSO president Pat Biancolli. "We would like to be able to use the facility on Sat-


Biancolli said the PTSO has not been able to hold some fundraisers at Riley School because of the German school's leasing agreement. Among the fundraisers mentioned were a car wash and a flea market.

According to the PTSO, the other elementary school parent/ teacher groups have not had to share their school buildings, but all the public schools in South Plainfield benefit from the rent money. The \$10,000 in annual rent goes into the general education coffers for use by the whole dis-

The Riley School PTSO suggested that the German school use all the schools in the district on a rotating basis, so that the burden is shared between the beneficiaries.

But the German school said a rotating facility would result in transportation expenses and confusion for their students, while moving to another elementary school would eventually put them

Lyons to become CEO of Forbes Newspapers

Charles A Lyons will join For-bes Newspapers on March 18 as the growing newspaper group's Chief Executive Officer. The announcement was made Tuesday by the organization's Chairman, Malcolm S. Forbes Jr.

"Chuck brings a wealth of experience in multiple-newspaper, suburban markets, and we're ex-

bes Newspapers embarks on its next growth phase," Forbes said.

The appointment reflects a restructuring of top management for the group, which has grown from five weeklies to 15 publications in the last three years, Forbes added.

Lyons will be responsible for overall operations of the company. He joins John J. O'Brien, who continues as Forbes Newspapers president and publisher.

"I have known Chuck Lyons for several years, and worked very hard to attract him to our organization," O'Brien said.

O'Brien is a member of the board of directors of Suburban Newspapers of America (SNA), an group representing community-oriented dailies and weeklies, and Lyons is SNA's president.

Lyons leaves his position as president of DCI Communications of Alexandria, Va., to join Forbes Newspapers. DCI publishes 20 weekly newspapers with a circulation of 520,000 in the suburbs of Washington, D.C.

Previously he was president of Chesapeake Publishing Corp. in Easton, Md., where 23 newspapers with a combined circulation of 460,000 are published.

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND THE CODE OF THE BOROUGH OF SOUTH PLAINFIELD, CHAPTER 74 EN-

TITLED "ANIMALS".

BE IT ORDAINED by the Governing Body of the Borough of South Plainfield that the Code of the Borough of South Plainfield Chapter 74 entitled "Animals" be amended as follows:

SECTION 1. The following definitions are hereby included under Section 74-1 "Definitions": CAT: Any member of the domestic feline species; male

CAT OF LICENSING AGE: Any cat which has attained
the age of seven months or which possesses a set of per-

ANIMAL: For the purpose of this Ordinance, animal

ANIMAL. For the purpose of this Ordinance, animal shall mean dog or cat.

ANIMAL CONTROL AUTHORITY: A person or agency designated or certified by the State of New Jersey to enforce the provisions of this Ordinance.

OWNER: When applied to the proprietorship of a cat shall include every person having a right of property (or custody) in such cat and every person who has such cat in his/her keeping or who harbors or maintains a cat or knowingly permits a cat to remain on or about any premises occupied by that person.

CATTERY: Shall mean any room or group of rooms, cage or exhibition pen, not part of a kennel, wherein cats for sale are kept or displayed.

PERSON: Any individual, corporation, partnership, organization or institution commonly recognized by law as a unit.

LICENSING AUTHORITY: The agency or department of the Borough of South Plainfield or any designated representative thereof charged with administering the issuance and/or revocation of permits and licenses under the provisions of this Ordinance.

NEUTERED: Rendered permanently incapable of reproduction as certified by a licensed veterinarian.

SECTION 2. The following new section Article 3 entitled "Cat Licensing" shall be added to the above referenced Code of the Borough of South Plainfield:

A. Provision Relating to Rabies Vaccination of Cats

1. Vaccination and License Requirements

No person shall own, keep, harbor or maintain any cat over seven months of age within the Borough of South Plainfield unless such call svaccinated and ticensed. The provisions of this section do not apply to cats held in a cattery or those held by a state or federal licensed research facility or a veterinary establishment where cats research facility or a veterinary establishment where cats are received or kept for diagnostic, medical, surgical or other treatments or licensed animal shelters, pounds.

All cats shall be vaccinated against rabies by a licensed veterinarian in accordance with the latest "Compendum of Animal Rabies Vaccines and Recommendations for Immunization" published by the National Association of State Public Health Veterinarians, except as provided for in Section (4)

Hardship case

Do judges have a special fondness for developers? The state Supreme Court created a bonanza for builders with its doublebarreled Mount Laurel decisions on affordable housing Last month, the county Tax Appeals Court decided to give Jollyland Inc., owners of the land that will become South Plainfield's newest golf-driving range, a new property tax valuation that cuts the assessment by two-thirds on the grounds that a stateimposed ban on sewer hook-ups had reduced the value of the

Remember, now, that Jollyland bought the property well after the Department of Environmental Protection imposed the ban, which raises the question of whether Jollyland had created what zoning and planning board officials refer to as a "self-imposed hardship." Municipalities are not allowed to reject development proposals on the grounds of conditions that are outside the applicant's control, such as traffic congestion. The sewer-link ban is an outside limitation, one open to remedy. Why should a developer be able to use it to justify a lower tax assessment, particularly when he knew about the ban before he plunked down his money?

Evidently these considerations did not trouble the tax appeals judge, who has created an opening that several more developers are preparing to push themselves through. We always thought developers were involved in a business that involved certain financial risks, rather than a charity to be nursed along by sympathetic officials.

Flags

As patriotic fervor increases and the number of flags flying from houses multiply, it seems time to offer a few pointers for citizens who want to hang Old Glory on their property.

It is customary for citizens to fly the flag from sunrise to sunset on buildings and on stationary flagpoles in the open. It may be displayed at night, preferably illuminated, on special occasions. (The flag that flies day and night over the east and west ends of the Capitol are not floodlit but receive illumination from the Capitol dome.) The flag should be hoisted and lowered briskly, and never allowed to touch the ground or the floor.





Borough lawsuit in works over sewer hook-up ban for elderly housing center

Correspondent A proposal before the Plainfield Joint Sewer Meeting to prohibit sewer hook-up for the borough's planned housing project for the elderly will be challenged in court by the borough Housing Authority.

According to the secretary of the Housing Authority, Gayle Corazza, the "necessary paperwork" has been filed at the courthouse accusing the joint committee of illegal sewage line restrictions in South Plainfield.

The housing project, to be built on a 5.2-acre lot at the intersection of Morris Avenue and Chambers Street, is slated to begin construction in August.

Gayle Corazza said the joint committee was formed by the surrounding areas back in the 1930s to regulate all the sewer lines out of Plainfield. She said that South Plainfield, Green Brook and Dunellen all share the sewer lines with Plainfield. Corazza explained that South Plainfield, like Green Brook and Dunellen, was placed on the sewer line restriction because they allegedly owed two years worth of uncollected sewer line fees and interest accrued by Plainfield.

"It is terrible no one can build in the town right now because of this ban on our sewer lines. Any new construction that was being built when the Joint Committee age out of a possible 4.00.

placed the ban remains unoccupied or incompleted," noted Gavle Corazza.

Housing Authority chairman Michael English said that because the Department of Environmental Protection and other agencies had approved the housing project before the sewer ban was imposed, the proposal could be 'grandfathered" through despite

The final site plans, which were recently approved by the Housing Authority, call for five two-story buildings that will house approximately 102 units. The building will be the home for low- and moderate-income senior citizens as part of the town's affordable housing obligation.

English said that the Housing Authority will be advertising for construction bids sometime in March.

"What happens is that we accept all bid proposals for 45 lays; then we review all proposals for another 45 days before making any final approvals," English explained.





Special Education swimming team wins a total of 30 medals

It was a special competition for 13 South Plainfield swimmers. The 13 athletes who competed in the State Tournament of Champions Swimming Meet Feb. 23 at the Cranford Community Pool took home 30 medals, according to Special Education Parents' Association President Lyn Carlton.

The athletes trained on Sunday afternoons over a three-month period from November through February, she said, and returned to South Plainfield with 15 gold medals, 13 silver medals and two bronze medals.

"This recognition of a job well done will hopefully bolster the self-esteem of these athletes and assist them in channeling in-

creased energy into their school work," Ms. Carlton said.
"Danny Kunst worked very hard with the team, but became ill just a few days before the race and was unable to compete," Ms.

Carlton added. Over 200 athletes from 19 communities from as far as Cape May participated in the swimming meet, she said.

"In many cases athletes were accompanied by coaches only," Ms. Carlton added. "Having a cheering section of 40, in addition to the athletes, showed everyone present that South Plainfield supports its youths in their endeavors.

And the cheering and team spirit were all the more enthusiastic among team members because they wore matching hooded sweatshirts, complete with a green tiger and "South Plainfield" imprinted on the front, donated by the B.P.O. Elks No. 2298 of South Plainfield.

"Ricochet Health and Raquet Club and the Elks have come to the assistance of the youth of South Plainfield in making this a very rewarding and memorable experience," she added.

This is the second year that South Plainfield students participate in the New Jersey Tournament of Champions Swimming Meet, Carlton said, adding that last year the team of 11 young men and women who participated took home 27 medals.

The goals of the Tournament of Champions swimming program are to provide interested athletes with the opportunity of learning basic swimming skills; to give experienced swimmers the opportunity to improve their skills; to provide meaningful competition in the sport of swimming for all registered athletes, regardless of their ability level; to provide an atmosphere of success which will encourage athletes to strive to do their best; and to encourage parent involvement and support of athletes endeavors, Carlton said.



Professional debuts for three musicians

One of the area's major musical events took place Sunday at Raritan Valley Community College when three youthful winners of the 1990 Young Pianists Competition of New Jersey made their debut as professional musicians.

The three were concerto soloists with the Central Jersey Symphony Orchestra under the baton of Dr. Roger Briscoe.

Christopher Johnson of Warren, gold medal winner, played the Rachmaninoff Second Piano Concerto in C minor; Gloria Cheng of Bridgewater, silver medalist, played the Mozart Piano Concerto in D minor K. 466; and Suzi Kim, also of Bridgewater, bronze medal winner played the Mendelssohn Piano Concerto in G minor.

Yelena Ivanov, artistic director of the competition stated that, "Like most teachers, I like my students to enter as many competitions as possible," said artistic director Yelena Ivanov, "for working within the confines of a studio you don't know how your pupil stands up against others or how your work rates against other

teachers.
"We need that contact with others," she continued. "We need to judge our own work and that of our colleagues. A competition is the natural way to do it.

The competition, she noted, is weighted by age and experience.

"If a student is 10 years old and has studied for two years, he will compete only against someone of the same age with the same number of years of study." she said. "We won't limit ourselves to a certain number of winners. We want to give as many students as possible an opportunity to perform publicly.

Each contestant receives a detailed report card with an analysis of how he scored on such vital points as rhythm, note accuracy, phrasing, dynamics, expression, hand position, memory, pedaling, style, level of difficulty and stage

Ivanov holds a doctorate in music from Moscow Conservatory. Before traveling to America in 1979, she had a successful teaching career at the Gnesinky Music Institute in Moscow, a school comparable to Juilliard or the Curtis Institute in the U.S. She maintains her own teaching studio in Bridgewater.

KRATKY FILM

CZECHOSLOVAK ANIMATION EXPLORED IN NEW EXHIBIT AT THE ZIMMERLI MUSEUM

ranslated literally from the Czech language, "Kratky Film" means "short film." It is also the name of a division of the government-sponsored group of production studios based in Prague, where Czech filmmakers produce animated films of a complexity and sophistication seldom dreamed of, much less achieved, by their American counterparts.

Kratky Film: The Art of Czechoslovak Animation," opening this Saturday and continuing through July 2 at the Jane Voorhees Zimmerli Art Museum in New Brunswick, showcases the productions of Kratky Film as well as the work of, among others, Jiri Trnka, Pavel Koutsky, Bozena Mozisova and Jan Svankmajer hardly household names in America, but filmmakers whose work is known and respected by film professionals and knowledgable critics.

Though cartoons will be a large part of the exhibition, viewers encountering this work for the first time will probably be most intrigued by the elaborate puppet and stop-motion animation work Jiri Trnka, as well-known in Czechoslovakia as Walt Disney is in America, specialized in this painstakingly detailed "puppet film" technique. As noted in the exhibition catalogue by Jeffrey Wechsler, assistant director for curatorial affairs, filmmakers in Czechoslovakia consider animation "co-eval with live action as a form of professional filmmaking, and of expressive cinema. It is considered a mediu8m worthy of adaptations of literary masterworks from Shakespeare to Poe, from Boccaccio to Lewis Carroll, and capable of communicating human tragedy, social commentary, slapstick and satire, beloved regional folk tales, bizarre fantasy and profound psychological drama — in other words, the full gamut of life and legend."

Though Czech animators are not widely known, some of their work has been shown in this country. Czech animators worked on the dream sequences in the wildlife adventure film The Bear, and a limited United States release was given to Alice, Jan Svankmajer's unsettling 1988 adaptation of Alice in Wonderland.

The Zimmerli exhibition will feature 70 framed animation "cels" along with 12 groupings of stop-motion puppets in original sets. Animated films on video will be shown throughout visiting hours, while 12 short films on celluloid will be screened Sundays from 1:30 p.m. to 4 p.m.

The Zimmerli Art Museum is located at George and Hamilton streets on the College Avenue campus of Rutgers University. The museum is open Monday through Friday from 10 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and Saturdays and Sundays from noon to 5 p.m. The museum is closed Wednesdays.

Relocation of German School could cost district \$10G in rent

(Continued from page A-1) in the same situation with another parent/teacher organization.

The board has offered the School Administration Grand Building as a possible substitution, but the German school said that the facility would be too small for their enrollment. Currently, the German school has 150 students, and enrollment is looking up. At one time, the school taught as many as 250 students per semester. The school employs about 20 teachers per semester.

The board has also offered the middle school and high school as potential facilities, but the furniture would be too big for their younger schools. Another possibility considered was splitting the German school into splinter groups at a few different facilities, but that would ruin the close-knit, cohesive identity the school has

The German School is one of the largest private language schools in the area. They teach German to a wide range of ages. from 3-year-olds to adults. Classes are given in basic language skills, advanced conversational German,

German literature and business German, with tuition costing a little over \$100 per class.

Robert Bengivenga, a South Plainfield businessman and resident who is running for a seat on the board of education this year, is not happy about the fact that the German school may be leaving the district.

"Not only is it paying the school system \$10,000 per year, it's bringing in people to spend money in town on Saturdays," he said.

According to Bengivenga, whose adult brother has been a student at the school for a few years, many of the people who drop off their children on Saturdays tend to stay in the area and shop while their kids learn a second langu-

"I think it's good for the community,", he continued. "If it's paying it's way, and bringing some culture to the community, then I'd like to see it in South Plainfield.

"The thing that really burns me up is that the school is just sitting there with the heat on," said Bengivenga. "I don't know why they do these things."

The handling of the \$500,000 bond for the pool was also questioned by resident Frank Mikorski. "I've heard three different versions of how it's being handled. People should have an answer," Mikorski said.

Another resident wanted to know if the responsibility for the bond would fall on the taxpayers if the department didn't get the projected membership.

Mayor Michael Woskey said, 'Nothing is guaranteed except birth and death."

The pool is providing a valuable service to the community,' Woskey told them.

Resident and former Mayor Dan Gallagher wanted to know if the Community Pool sign had been repaired.

According to a 1990 survey conducted by the Recreation Department, approximately 19 percent of the families in a given town (pool-sporting communities surveyed included Metuchen, Princeton, Westfield, Clark and New Providence) join their community pool. "That would bring us up to about 1000 families," said Dunbar. "That is our target membership; it would be just about right for this size community."

Last year, reconditioning of the grounds included putting up a playground furnished with new equipment for children ranging from 18 months to 10 years old. This year, part and parcel of spring cleaning, the facility is being refurbished with designated picnic areas and a beach volleyball court - players get to kick sand instead of stubbing their toes on blacktop. Family memberships are available for \$175; single member-

ships are priced at \$100 and single senior citizen memberships can be purchased at a 65 percent discount, or \$35. Out-oftowners are admitted only as guests on a per day basis.

In a move to make management of the pool and its resources more efficient, a late registration fee of \$25 for those signing up after April 15 was recently adopted by the Borough Council.

"That was meant to encourage people to sign-up earlier," said Dunbar. "It would give us revenue for start-up costs and give us barometer for spending allocations.

The borough purchased the pool from South Plainfield Comunity Pool Inc. for \$320,000.



UNION - Back in the 40's, remember what Winston Churchill, Franklin D. Roosevelt and Joseph Stalin were called during the war? "The Big Three."

Well, in the 90's, South Plainfield High School's wrestling team has its own big three, and their names are Kevin McCann, Sean Brooks and Nick DiGrazia.

They have been the mainstay of the success of the Tigers' mat program over the past season, and next week each of them go for the ultimate: a state championship at Jadwin Gym in Princeton.

The terrific trio qualified for Princeton by finishing in the top three in their respective weight classes at last week's Region 3 meet at Union High School.

"At this level, these guys have been outstanding, not just this season, but through their years here," said Tigers' coach Mike Buggey. "There is a lot of luck involved in winning a state championship, but these kids have the ability to do it, too. They are as good as anybody in the state."

McCann marched to the 135pound championship in his typically dominating fashion. He opened by pinning Ben Williams of Union in just 2:54, then he routed Andy Trocyzynski of Clark's Johnson Regional in the semifinals, 13-1.

In the finals, he tangled with Irvington's Kamal Brown and this bout was just as easy as the other two. After a scoreless first period, McCann scored one point after Brown was called for a second stall warning, then he scored an escape and a takedown to grab a 4-0 lead before putting Brown on his back and decking him in 3:14.

"I used an underhook to pin him," said McCann, who won his second consecutive region title. "It was nice to win at the regions again, but I'm using this as a stepping stone to Princeton. I finished sixth down there last year, and I just want to go as far as I can."

He just might have South Plainfield's best shot for a state crown, since he was seeded third at 135 and will open Wednesday against



Our Piscataway office was buzzing about lunch at Buzzy's Restaurant and Pub (I couldn't resist the alliteration). Several of my co-workers eat here daily and suggested that I visit Buzzy's for dinner

The restaurant celebrated its first anniversary in February and, juding by the crowd that Friday night (by the time we were ready to leave all of the tables were filled, they will have the opportunity to celebrate many more. Buzzy's, owned and operated by the Bussiere family, Joseph, Micheal and Dave, was once a large bar with pool tables and is now a family restaurant and pub with a separate dining room. The family never owned a restaurant before but they certainly know cooking. All three brothers worked with their father in his catering business.

The name Buzzy's is a family nickname attributed to the three brothers who were involved in sports at Edison High School. Success in sports may be part of the reason for their success in business. But whatever the

reason, it is always nice to see three enterprizing young men succeed.

Joseph and Michael Bussiere do the cooking and Dave manages the dining room and bar. Because it is a family run business, it is not unusual to see Dave serving food on busy nights such as the night we were there. Davd told us that the bar has its own grill but customers can order from the regular menu as well.

The room is done in restful shades of burgundy and beige with wainscotting on the lower half of the walls. The table setting is very informal with burgundy paper napkins, fresh flowers and a menu of the nightly specials. Buzzy's dining room has new editions hanging on the far wall, a hand-carved scene of the docks at Nantucket, Rhode Island. The owners are planning to add several more wood carvings in the future.

The menu is American with a sprinkling of Italian and seafood choices, including the special menu there are 17 appetizers, three soups and several salads. Cost of appetizers range from \$.95 for garlic bread or French fries to \$5.95 for an Italian seafood salad. Some of the more unusual appetizers include homemade potato and cheese perogies (\$4.50) or crab meltaways (\$4.95).

at least 14 specials. The dinner prices range from \$7.95 for sauteed cajun creole to \$17.95 for a 20 oz. Texas T-bone, but the average cost is \$9 to The specials include an assortment of seafood, Italian and New Orleans style dishes. All entrees are served with a salad and a choice of steak fries, baked potato or rice.

My husband ordered the roasted clams and was surprised to see a dozen of them for only \$4.95. My choice was a vegetable platter (\$4.95). This consisted of steamed broccoli, cauliflower, zucchini, carrot slices, squash and mushrooms with melted American cheese and a herb flavoring. I asked our friendly and very informed waitress Angel to please serve them without the cheese.

Angel also informed us that the house salad came with baby shrimp

and bits of hard boiled egg, but we could order it without one or both if we so chose. The salad was served on a cold platter and consisted of lettuce, cherry tomatoes, onion, cucumbers and the baby shrimp and

Both of our entrees were ordered from the special menu. My husband had the blackened grouper (\$11.95). This consisted of two nice size pieces of grouper that was spicy hot as ordered. The fish was fresh and very tasteful


I ordered the broiled lobster tails, two 4-oz. tails for \$13.95. The tails were cooked perfectly, not overdone at all.

For dessert our waitress recommended the Tollhouse a la mode (\$2.75). This was a pie, served hot, with ice cream and whipped cream. There was enough for two of us to share.





S&L bailout should not affect first-time buyers

Concerned that the savings and loan bailout means bad news for homebuyers hunting for a mortgage? "Don't be," says Marjorie Horowitz, president of the Westfield Board of Realtors. "If you can afford the down payment and interest rates, you should have no trouble qualifying for a loan.

You do, however, need to educate yourself about lenders, the business of lending, and your options and responsibilities," continues Horowitz. "Begin by meeting with a professional-a real estate agent who is not representing a specific lender, but rather one who will provide a list of reliable lenders and suggest other possible sources for a mortgage.

"In addition," Horowitz says, "brush up on your mortgage terminology. The more knowledgeable you are before you meet with potential lenders, the better you'll be able to evaluate their mortgage packages.

Local savings and loans head the list of common sources for a mortgage. Commercial banks are another option. "Shop around," advises Horowitz. "Begin with one with which you are most familiar-possibly a previous lender-and ask a lot of questions. Once you have a feel for the different types of mortgages, you'll feel more confident asking questions elsewhere.

"Mortgage bankers or brokers ar another route many homebuyers choose," says Horowitz. "They are in touch with many mortgage sources, and often can get better loan terms and rates. A fee may be charged for this service. Again, remember to shop around. Lenders are in the business of selling loans. Don't be afraid to negotiate with them on rate and terms or ask for a tailor-made mortgage to meet your specific needs.

'Don't overlook less traditional sources of financing," Horowitz advises. "These include life insurance companies, finance companies, credit unions, pension funds, foundation/endowment money, friends, relatives and even seller financing. Your real estate agent or mortgage banker or broker should be able to provide you additional information on these alternatives. In addition, your real estate agent may be helpful as a third-party point of view when it comes time to evaluate your choices.

'Once you've decided on a direction to go, be prepared to supply the usual documents and personal financial records," says Horowitz. "Before you arrange a meeting with your chosen lender, ask what you need to bring. This will save you time.

'Make sure you are clear on all aspects of the mortgage before signing the paperwork," recommends Horowitz. "If you have questions or problems, talk with professionals-your lawyer, tax adviser and real estate agent. Don't go it alone.
