Three other residents did file, however, and the lack of competition for the open three-year terms virtually guarantees them positions on the board.

Only a successful write-in campaign by a fourth party could keep one of the three candidate from being elected to the board.

Man found guilty of sex assault

The 70-year-old borough man authorities believe is a fugitive from Florida is behind bars again this week after collapsing in a courtroom last week.

Claude Akridge, whom law enforcement officials say escaped from a Florida prison nearly 36 years ago, fell to the floor last Thursday minutes after a jury found him guilty of sexually as-saulting an 8-year-old girl, As-sistant County Prosecutor Joseph Rea said.

"The judge had gone, the jury had left the bench," he said. "He collapsed as he was being led

Mr. Rea said Mr. Akridge was taken to Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital in New Brunswick.

The assistant prosecutor was unsure what caused the collapse, but said he didn't believe Mr.

Zushma will get paid overtime

After putting in 700 hours of unpaid overtime last year, Emergency Management Coordinator Michael Zushma is looking for some com-

The Borough Council appears willing to grant Mr. Zushma's request for a flat, one-time fee of \$5,000 to cover it, as members introduced by a 5-1 vote Thursday an amendment to the 1993 salary ordinance.

Mr. Zushma earns \$6,163 annually in his part-time position as office of emergency management (OEM) coordinator, and \$36,412 a year as part-time code officer.

He is asking for overtime compensation for the OEM position only. That would raise his 1993 earnings for the job to \$11,163.

The salary ordinance amendment also included raising the salary of the OEM clerk typist from a part-time figure of \$8,561 to a fulltime amount of \$13,500.

Mr. Zushma, a South Plainfield resident who has worked for the borough in various positions for nearly 20 years, said the amount of time required to run the OEM office has grown steadily over the years.

"There's a lot to do," he said. "It's not just waiting for an emergency to happen. Actually, it's disaster planning. I have to plan for things that might happen, even if they don't happen." Mr. Zushma said some of his coordinator du-

ties include: reporting to the scenes of disasters, such as the recent explosions; inspecting the sites afterward; attending meetings; training others; planning; researching available grant money sources; and writing and submit-

ting written reports to the county and state.

In the past three years as code enforcement officer, he said he issued 197 violations - most of which required that he appear in court and more than 500 warning notices. "They're both full-time jobs," he said.

Mr. Zushma said he regularly puts in 15 hours of overtime per week, not including time spent on the scenes of emergencies

"I like what I'm doing," he said. "It just involves a lot of time. I'm not saying I want 100 percent compensation. I give my all to the community. I don't think what I'm asking for is too much.

In defending the coordinator's request against Councilman Michael DeNardo's objections, Council President Daniel Gallagher said Mr. Zushma could make three times the amount if he were paid overtime at the same rate as the borough's lowest paid laborer.

A Hancock Street woman accused last week of killing her 2-year-old daughter pled innocent Feb. 23 to the charge of aggravated manslaughter, Assistant Middlesex County Prosecutor Thomas Kapsak

Alliance against drug abuse looks for community support

The South Plainfield Alliance for Substance Awareness (SPAFSA) has put out its Help Wanted sign.

Planning for the year ahead, alliance members put out a call recently for assistance in keeping children off drugs and alcohol.

Bill Beegle, chairman of the group and acting assistant Middle School principal, said the alliance donates to Project Graduation, the BABES program, organizes fund raisers and promotes peer leadership programs in the high school and middle school, among many other activities.

"We do a lot of different things," he said. "We need more help.

In existence since 1990, the municipal group sponsors programs and activities throughout the community, aiming to involve people from every facet of the borough in the anti-drug message.

The alliance also receives federal grant money and

matching local funds, Mr. Beegle said. Alliance money recently went for purchase of mate-

rials for a new classroom-taught program, which officials hope to put into the curriculum next year.

Lisa Campoli, an alliance member and the borough's school district substance awareness coordinator, quoted national statistics when she noted one in four American youngsters is a substance abuser, or lives in a family where substance abuse takes place.


The average age of the first-time user is 11 years old, she said.

"Since the programs have been around, we've noticed a decline in the alcohol and drug problems," he said.



Born Claude Gibson, Mr. Akridge was convicted of sexual assault on a 10-year-old girl and grand larceny in June 1954 in Broward County, Fla., officials have

said. The man, who has used several aliases throughout his life, was serving a 10-year sentence at Union Correctional Institution in Butler when he escaped in May 1957, authorities said.

A routine fingerprint check done last month before a pre-trial hearing in the more recent case connected Mr. Akridge to the Florida case, they said.

Business advisory group is created

The Borough Council last week introduced an ordinance authorizing establishment of a business advisory group in the borough.

The move was meant to give business owners input on council decisions concerning the business community before the decisions become law.

The idea behind forming the watchdog group is similar to the one that led officials to establish the 10-member taxpayers advisory group in January.

The taxpayer group studies proposed ordinances and resolutions dealing with finances - "anything that has to do with spending money," one official has said.

Similarly, the business advisory group will review potential local legislation, and offer suggestions to the council.

The group will link members of the business community and local officials, soliciting input from busi-

One young man said he has heard district administrators and the school board are considering cutting the high school's shop programs.

"I think if they cut anything it should be the foreign language program," he said. "I believe they have too many teachers for foreign language.'

Another youth said he feels some guidance counselors concentrate on a few students while ignoring others, and still other counselors do little for their students.

A third young man objected to a special report in last week's Reporter that suggested SAT scores appear unfair to minorities.

'How do you figure they're unfair when every racial group takes the same exact test?" he said. "It's how much effort you put in that determines whether your score will be high or low."

Lip service

School district detractors copped out when time to act

Shame on you, the vociferous critics of the South Plainfield school system and Board of Education.

After the volume of complaints residents lodged against the board and district over the past few months, one might have expected a herd of candidates vying for the three seats open in April's race. But when the deadline for filing school board petitions arrived 4 p.m. last Thursday, only three people had filed to run. None of them were incumbents.

Applications were automatically mailed to the three incumbents, and three more were picked up from the school board offices. That's a grand total of only six potential candidates for three seats. (And kudos to the courageous three

How can people hope to change what's wrong with the school system if they don't challenge the group whom they blame for its perceived inadequacies?

The low number of candidates indicates a social disease far worse than apathy plagues South Plainfield; it smacks of despair. When people who could contribute useful skills to the district decide not to seek office because they feel they cannot change anything, or because they will never have the time to do the job right, that is despair. And despair is the only unforgivable sin in a political system of voter

Two weeks ago, the three incumbents were wavering on whether to seek re-election. Obviously, they made their decision, but if voters were truly interested in removing board members whom they felt were not doing the job they were elected for, what better time to strike than while those members were showing uncertainty?

Some of the loudest complainers may have opted not to run for fear they didn't have a chance of winning. But believe it or not, in politics winning isn't always everything. Often, the mere fact of a challenge can jostle apathetic incumbents out of their comfortable acceptance of the status quo. If the challenge comes from multiple, and possibly numerous, sources, that gentle jostle can escalate to a jumpstart. The real power of the vote is, after all, not to put people in office, but to remove them from office if they don't do their jobs.

But perhaps we are being too harsh. Perhaps there are good reasons why district detractors did not put words into action and run for a seat on the school board.

School board members do put in long hours without compensation. They lose time from their families, recreation and

They must become experts on everything from high finances to discipline policy to contract negotiations. They must be answerable to their constituents and go through the demanding process of running for re-election if they wish to continue serving their community.

And they are often targets of misdirected anger, blame

Perhaps those "outraged" taxpayers who chose not to seek their own spots on the school board knew that. If so, it's the worst kind of lip service.

Special report raises new questions

Driving by the explosion site on Park Avenue, and seeing the destruction, it's unbelievable how much damage can really occur. We read about gas explosions, see it on the news, and hear about them. But it seems we really can't focus on the impact until we see the actual site of the explosion. Or, we are personally affected by it.

My sympathy goes out to all the merchants that were affected on Park Avenue. I hope it won't be long that they will be able to put this all behind them.

After seeing the damage on Park Avenue, I thought of the explosion at Synergy Propane Co. It's frightening to realize now Synergy stores over 60,000 pounds of propane (and it's practically in our back yard).

We can consider ourselves lucky that it was the propane storage truck holding several hundred canisters of propane that blew up and not the ground

It is inconceivable the extent of damage that could have occurred if the ground tanks blew up. We would not be able to compare this type of explosion to the Park Avenue explosion.

As I read different newspaper articles, I am very thankful to the police officer (Karl Schuetz) who risked his life and went into Synergy's building to alert the employee (Angel Ortiz) who was unaware of the truck on fire. And to Mr. Ortiz, who then risked his life by moving several trucks out of the area. I commend both these individuals.

I would also like to say thank you to our fine police department, our volunteer fire department, our volunteer rescue squad, and all other emergency personnel who had a part in stopping a major disaster from happening in South Plainfield.

Praise for special report on education

I wish to thank you very much for the informative two-page spread on education in (The South Plainfield Reporter) Feb. 17.

If in 1994 we were to have the same pupil/teacher ratio (19.3) and the same pupil/administration (31.5) as in 1972, New Jersey would need about 58,500 teachers and 35,900 administrators, for its 1.13 million pupils. Using California ratios, New Jersey would need 47,000 teachers and 29,000 administrators. Thus, based on these ratios and the data shown by you (approximately 81,000 teachers and 68,000 administrators), New Jersey has an excess of somewhere between 22,000 and 34,000 teachers, and somewhere between 31,000 and 39,000 administrators.

Continuing this analysis, on a per annum basis, using your reported average New Jersey teacher sal-

ary of \$41,000, and applying this to administrators as well as teachers (for lack of better data) New Jersey is currently overspending by about \$2.2 billion, based on New Jersey ratios, or \$2.9 billion based on California ratios. For a population of about nine million people, this amounts to about \$240-\$320 per person, or about \$700-\$1000 per household. It is interesting to note that the overage for Highland Park would pay for the proposed school expansion/ renovation program two to three times over.

It is no wonder that so many people are so very angry with the school board, when this one single budget item alone could provide all, and more, than was ever requested. And make no mistake, the rejection of the bond issue was not a rejection of good schooling for Highland Park's children, but an anger

Earned Income Credit can aid taxes

To The Reporter:

It has come to my attention that there are thousands of people in New Jersey who don't claim their Earned Income Credit (EIC), a federal tax benefit for low-income families.

If you worked during part or all of 1992, earned less than \$22,370, and had a child living with you for more than half the year, you could be eligible for EIC. Both married and single parents, as well as working fami-

lies with foster children can be eligible. To receive this credit, parents must file a federal income tax form - 1040A or 1040 - and a Schedule EIC form. Both forms must be filed in order to receive the credit and families can receive as much as

Beginning Jan. 7 and continuing through April 30, New Jersey families can call this toll-free number, 1800-288-4EIC, for help. Callers will receive a packet containing a Schedule EIC, a list of volunteer tax assistance centers in their area and a checklist of information to bring with them.

If your family is eligible, you'll either owe less taxes or the government will mail you a check. You can get this EIC even if you don't owe income tax, and many unemployed people may also be eligible. Working parents who lost their jobs or had their hours cut in 1992 should apply if their income for last year was less than \$22,370.

In this time of economic belt-tightening this information can help working families get the most out of their paychecks.



There is nothing like lunch at a luncheonette

The words "T one H.R. to travel" hit me in the face as I walked through the front door of the luncheonette. Apron in hand and half-asleep, I reported to work at 6 a.m. The regular customers already had their usual seats at the counter. Hard rolls were buttered and wrapped and laid waiting. Urns of coffee perked as eggs sizzled on the griddle.

My cousin Anthony was the short-order cook at his familyowned luncheonette. Hoping to save money to buy a car, I accepted my aunt's and uncle's summer job offer. Nervously, I tied my apron and reported to my cousin Anthony, who was assigned the task of showing me the ropes. Guest-check pad in hand, he gave me the fastest training ever.

"Go ask those customers at that table what they would like to eat," he ordered. "Write it down. You get the drinks and I prepare the food. I'll call you when it's done.

Hands shaking, knees knocking, I walked over to the table as Anthony observed from behind the counter. Bagels, hard rolls, danish, egg sandwiches, and egg platters - it was hard to tell what the most popular breakfast item was. I was too busy to take notice.

A bus stop was right in front of the luncheonette, so there were numerous outgoing orders. Containers of coffee and tea had to be filled on a moment's notice. People are not that patient this early in the morning when they fear missing their bus.

"Coffee regular," "coffee light and sweet," "coffee black," "coffee milk no sugar," "tea," "don't dunk the bag," "do dunk the bag," "tea with milk," "tea without milk," "with sugar," "with lemon," "do you have honey?" were just some of the many split-second requests. Talk about total confusion.

Amid the morning craziness I constantly heard the other waitresses shouting, "T one H.R. to travel." The first day on the job and I was totally ignorant to lunch-eonette lingo. So hesitantly I asked, "Anthony, what does T one H.R. to travel' mean?" With a grin on his face, he answered, "Tony, one hard roll to go." And they did go. Dozens and dozens of hard rolls with butter traveled out of that luncheonette every morning.

The fast pace of the morning rush lasted until 10 a.m., after which time I had to refill all the salt and pepper shakers, milk creamers, napkin hoiders, and sugar dispensers for the lunch rush. After this I was ordered to check with Anthony on what items we were out of on today's lunch menu. Aunt Jo's homemade specialties of the day provided variety and helped to reduce that everpresent chance of having to say 'sorry, we're out of that today."

Aunt Jo prepared different lunch specials every day of the week. Fridays were always reserved for macaroni and cheese and fresh fish.

The lunch rush was even worse than the breakfast rush. We were surrounded by hungry people racing a clock while they ravenously gobbled up all the macaroni and cheese and fresh fish. There was no time to breathe, let alone think. We were much too busy. Orders were filled, food was eaten, tables were cleaned, dishes were washed, and tips were collected.

Although the hours were early and the work fast-paced, being with my aunt, uncle, and cousin were fun and memorable. Perhaps Anthony and I had the best part of cooking and waitressing while Aunt Jo and Uncle Sam had the harder, worrysome part of running the business end of their luncheon-

The summer ended along with my job, and I managed to save enough money for a down payment on a brand-new car.







Tigers win 10th straight crown

Success and wrestling are words that have been synonymous with South Plainfield.

On Saturday, the Tigers claimed the District XII Championship, however, the title was more than just another win for South Plainfield, because it was the 10th consecutive championship the Tigers have won. Only Paulsboro, District 29, which has won 24 straight and Highland Regional, District 30, which has claimed 14 consecutive titles, have a longer winning streak than South Plainfield. Somerville gets its Irish up

Early St. Patrick's Day parade to bit Main Street Sunday

BY SHIVE MILITANEY WeekendPl.s Writer nyone planning to watch the Somerville St. Patrick's Parade Sunday can expect to witness something perhaps never before seen in any parade

As far as Patrick "Joseph" Mulrooney knows, no other parade ever has been led by a husband

and wife team.

A Somerville resident Mulroomey said he considered it a Peruine honor when parade cochairmen Neil Mahoney and William T. Cooper asked him to serve as grand marshal. As grateful as he was for the distinction. Mulrooney had one request.

I said. There's somebody else that should be honored at the same time." " he recalled last

With approval from Cooper and Mahoney, Mulrooney's wife, Margaret, also will act as Grand Marshal. A member of the parade committee, Mulrooney said his wife also is an active volunteer in the community. Appropriately Margaret Mulrooney halls from Ireland, too, her husband said.

"I think this is going to be the first parade that will have a Mr. and Mrs. Grand Marshal." Mulrooney said. "I have seen a fair number of parades land never seen it mentioned

In its third year since a two-year histos, the Somerville St. Patrick's Parade is scheduled to start at 1:30 p.m. Sunday at the intersection of Grove and Main streets and end less than a mile away in the Immaculate Conception parking lot on West End Avenue

Kicking off the festivities will be a 1 p.m. performance at the reviewing stand by the young students of the Elizabeth-based Peter Smith School of Irish Dance

And then, as things start to wind down, more celebrating begins. Several gatherings usually are scheduled each year after the parade. One popular one takes place at Jack O'Commor's on Route 22 east. Bridgewater. Sunday starts the restaurant's annual Irish festival. featuring old-fashioned comed beef and cabbage, Irish soda bread and Irish beer (available in green. of course), and live traditional music by the Turlock Duo, the Willie Lynch Trio and the Irish Rakes.

As many as 75 marching units are expected to participate in the parade, and if last year's number's mean anything, another 12,000 spectators likely will line the sets for the 90-minute event. Mahoney said.

A combination of 16 bagpipe and high school bands are on the roster, as well as a half-dozen floats. local and state officials, several scout troops, volunteer fire departments and rescue squads.

horse, and antique autos and fire equipment. Cooper said.

The parade was a tradition throughout the 1980s, until lack of support canceled the event in 1990 and 1991. Cooper said. But with financial support from fund-raisers and the business community, the parade is on its way again.

Working with a \$14,000 budget. the volunteer committee of less than a dioxen counts largely on backing from more than 100 businesses and professionals from the area. Cooper said.

He explained that many years ago, traveling minstrels usually were treated well lest they write songs about their impoint hosts. spreading word and naming

names throughout the countryside. Competition from other parades is the main reason the Somerville spectacle is held two Sundays before the official St. Patrick's Day observation March 17

Although resurrecting the parade was a massive undertaking Mahoney, who boasts an extensive financial and professional planning background, said he accepted the challenge to gain the sense of community he recalls from child-TOOK.

'Main Street Somerville reminded me of where I grew up said the former upstate New York small town resident. "When they stopped doing the parade. I felt cheated

"The first year was a nightmare," he said. "But it has gotten easier

But if one St. Par's parade won't suffice for some spectators and participants, another grand display is planned next weekend in Wood-

The 21st Annual Woodbridge St. Patrick's Day Parade actually is scheduled for March 13

"As far as I know, it's the largest parade in New Jersey," said Pat Burns, a member of the organizing committee. "It has guite a following. We usually have upwards of 100 [marching] units. Sponsored entirely by the Amer-

The Woodbridge Pover Watch environmental group will have a float contest entry, as will the American Irish Association, which has designed a float to give spectators a peek into the typical Irish COTTARE

As many as 17 bands are expeded, including a 23-piece Trenton bagpipe band, a group from Staten Island, the Priendly Sons of Old Bridge, and the award winning Union County Irish Association band. Shaughnessy said.

Bitter sweet

Drug lord Snipes looks for way out in verbose 'Sugar Hill'

here are many questions an audience member could ask after seeing Sugar Hill, Leon Ichaso's Harlem-based melodrama starring Wesley Snipes, but the most glaring one, never answered, is if you saw your mother die of a heroin overdose, and then saw your father shot repeatedly by drug dealers, would you see this as a sign that you should get into the drug business?

Snipes plays Roemello Skuggs, who is, er, reminiscing about these two incidents when we first meet him. In classic gangster movie construction, Roemello, at the height of his power, wants out of the dirty business. His brother, Raynathan (Michael Wright), is not thrilled with this decision. You sit there for hours waiting for Snipes

to say that "as soon as I think I'm out, they pull me back in." But that's left for better movies.

It's not that the people in this picture don't talk a lot. In fact, when they're not shooting at each other, all they do is talk, at length, language that every kid on the street would surely pick up ("I am consumed by chaos").

As in Carlito's Way, a movie this one resembles in more ways than one, Roemello's chance to escape his self-made trap is embodied in a woman - here, the upwardly-mobile Melissa (Theresa Randle), a struggling actress in a rare example of wit, Roemello's reaction to this news is "what restaurant?") whose mother (Leslie Uggams, of all people) doesn't say much - a rarity in this movie - but can disapprove of you with a quick glance.

Every gangster movie cliche is explored in its glory, and each one has been done better in other films. Roemello's plan to leave Harlem and go to North Carolina, where his parents grew up, is a secret, except to

everyone he knows, including the bad guys. Ray doesn't want to leave Harlem because this is the only place where he's "somebody." There is much talk of gang wars after the new guy in the neighborhood (Ernie Hudson) kills Roemello's best friend. In short, there is much talk going on, and much of it will make you run for the

There's also an anti-drug message straight out of a Nancy Reagan "just say no" training film. Everybody who ever tries any controlled substance ends up a hideous junkie, or dead. But that's not saying much, since much of the cast ends up dead by the end of the movie, and if you've ever seen a crime drama before, that should not be giving much away.

The one and only unexpected asset of Sugar Hill is it's supporting cast. Clarence Williams III (yes, Linc) is very impressive as Roemello and Ray's father, who falls into the "hideous junkie" category. Abe Vigoda (yes, Fish) proves he's still alive, and a good actor, as the grandfatherly crime boss and Hudson is as nasty as you want him to be.

Snipes does his usual good job, but he's saddled (by screenwriter Barry Michael Cooper) with some of the least plausible dialogue ever inserted into a supposedly streetwise movie. The "consumed by

chaos" lie is not atypical, especially in the unfortunate voice-overs Roemello is supposedly speaking to his dead mother.

This may be the most long-winded gangster movie since Francis Ford Coppola gave up the franchise. Which wouldn't be so bad, if there were anything at all original about the story being told. But we're given a string of gangster-movie set pieces, in no particular order, and with virtually no emotional core.

Ichaso (Crossover Dreams, El Super) makes Harlem look really nice, and the photography, by Bojan Bazelli, is impressive, but a series of photographs would have had considerably more impact without the windy philosophizing about the good old days in the drug business when the addicts were just coming back from 'Nam.

It would also have been nice if, every half-hour or so, there would have been some flash of humor, just to give us an impression that we should care whether Roemello ever gets out of here or not. As it is, we're more confused about how he got into this trap than worried about whether he'll escape.

Not quite the 'best of times,' but a terrific 'Tale'

ollowing his successful adaptation of Great Expectations, Paper Mill Playhouse Artistic Director Robert Johanson returns to Charles Dickens with A Tale of Two Cities, a lavish adaptation of the classic historical novel which chronicles "the best of times" and "the worst of times" during the French Revolution.

A Tale of Two Cities is Dickens's panoramic view of the revolution, the factors which contributed to the uprising, and the painful human toll incurred by its results. At the heart of the tale is the love story between Charles Darnay (Michael James Reed,) a French exile who rejects his aristocratic heritage, and Lucie Manette (Nancy Bell), the beautiful woman he marries and follows back to her home in London. Darnay, who favors a "new philosophy" of social order, is accused of espionage upon his arrival in London, but his freedom is preserved thanks to Sydney Carton (Christopher Innvar), a look-alike who resembles Darnay closely enough to place doubt into the minds of the jury.

Unfortunately, Carton, a lonely cynic who discovers not only the meaning of love but also of sacrifice during the tragic course of A Tale of Two Cities, is also hopelessly in love with Lucie. Simmering around this trio is the inevitable, earth-shattering history which begins with the storming of the Bastille and ends at the guillotine.

Johanson has done a fine job of maintaining the power of Dickens's masterful storytelling and the emotional extremism which makes his characters so memorable. In his efforts to remain true to the flavor and structural elements of the Dickensian text, though, Johanson might have left out a bit of the imagination he exhibits in an Act Two segment during which he momentarily establishes an exciting, almost cinematic cross-cutting rhythm between two scenes, linked by transitional words of dialogue. Perhaps a modicum of the overwhelming reverence which permeates the production might have been sacrificed for a touch more

of this sort of theatrical inventiveness. Though the text of this adaptation is workmanlike and dramatically sound, there is little surprise to be found in the transition from page to stage.

Among the large cast, Innvar is a standout as Carton, particularly during his early scenes as a cynical, hard-drinking scoundrel. He is appropriately heroic as the story moves forward, but perhaps slightly less effective because the stage Cities requires him to make the leap to altruism and sacrifice in a far less leisurely manner than the novel. As Lucie, Nancy Bell is properly delicate and compassionate, and, as the exiled Darnay, Michael James Reed is all virtue and idealism.

Much of the supporting cast of A Tale of Two Cities is more memorable because their roles are more colorful and, in some cases, enormously popular standouts from the canon of classic literary characterizations. As the passionately vengeful Madame Defarge, Judith Roberts is a vivid, often downright frightening presence, and Margaret Hall is extremely amusing as Miss Pross, Lucie's ever dutiful lady servant. In other supporting roles, Kevin Chamberlin as

the boorish Mr. Cruncher and John Rainer as the pompous C.J. Stryver are especially effective.

Though Johanson's text includes only brief passages of narration from Dickens's prose, these passages remind one that Dickens, despite the considerable successes of this production, is perhaps best savored on the page. The hope, though, is that so spectacular and entertaining an adaptation as this will lead some audience members back to the bookshelf. The Paper Mill production, as it stands, is an ideal family entertainment, captivating enough for adults and, for the vounger audience members, a fine history lesson as well as a visually sumptuous display of the power of storytelling and lit-

The Paper Mill'S specialty has always been lavish entertainment, and here A Tale of Two Cities delivers the goods. The production's most deserved accolades fall largely upon its design team, headed by set designer Michael Anania, lighting designer Ken Billington, and costume designer Gregg Barnes.

Anania, the resident scenic master at the Paper Mill, continues to stun with his creative work. He has apparently mastered the Paper Mill's cavernous space and uses seemingly every inch of that space effectively. His set design for A Tale of Two Cities is a multi-leveled masterpiece which allows Johanson to freely stage his text in foreground and background simultaneously. Billington's lighting further enhances the stage space, expressively establishing both mood and scene transition.

Though Johanson and the Paper Mill have done "far, far better things," and no doubt will continue to do so, this A Tale of Two Cities stands as a theatrically standard yet visually sumptuous, crowd-pleasing adaptation of a literary classic. Though the show fails to challenge, it definitely manages to entertain, and who would expect less from the Paper Mill Playhouse?

'Premiere Evening' of dance honors New Brunswick jazz legend

tribute to hometown jazz hero James P. Johnson is just one of three new dance works to be unveiled in New Brunswick Sunday by the American Repertory Ballet.

"Carolina Shout," choreographed by ARB Artistic Director Septime Webre to the music of Johnson, a native of New Brunswick and major contributor to the Harlem Renaissance scene of the '20s and the '30s, is part of a continuing tribute to Johnson. New Brunswick mayor James Cahill began the Black history Month-inspired tribute by declaring Feb. 1. which marked the 100th anniversary of Johnson's birth, as James P. Johnson Day in the Hub City.

'Carolina Shout," however, is just part of the ARB's "Premiere Evening," which also includes debuts of works by two other notable choreographers Michael Dowling, currently with the National Ballet of Canada, which will be danced to the music of avant-garde composer Brian Eno;

and Nicholas Rodriguez of Dance Compass will perform an as-yet untitled work featuring his "trademark full-bodied physicality.

The performance will also include a reprise of Webre's athletic "D-Construction," which is danced to the music of the late John Cage.

Johnson is credited as "the father of the stride piano" style and composed over 250 songs, including "The Charleston," which became the dance craze of the Roaring Twenties



Tovah's 'Cabaret' comes to Rahway

Actress-singer Tovah Feldshuh to perform at Union County Arts Center

t had been billed as "from Broadway to Cabaret," but late in the game, actress and singer Tovah Feldshuh hit upon the perfect marketing slogan for her appearance Saturday at the Union County Arts Center

"From Broadway to Rahway," she said during a recent phone interview. "I like the sound of that.

More to the point, from stage, screen and television to Rahway, where Feldshuh will perform her cabaret show called "Tovah: Crossovah! From Broadway to Cabaret," an evening of song, "chit-chat" and a series of "seriocomic" monologues that will showcase her diverse acting talents and large file of dialects.

"It's a tremendous amount of fun," she said. "The show will be in nine cities this year, and the response has been extremely positive."

Still, the advantage of doing a one-woman show means she can improve on it as she goes along.

"What I don't do is throw out what works," she said. "The Gershwin medley is good, or the Berlin medley, they tend to stay in. I will mix and match for Rahway, which is basically a crowd which comes to a theater (as opposed to a traditional cabaret environment], I will certainly do a great deal of characters. certain standards that I do, but I won't do as much ethnic stuff as I do when I'm hired by a heavy-duty Jewish charity or a heavy-duty Irish charity.

Ethnic characters, however, like her own Grandma Ada and Madame Violetta, "the opera teacher who cannot find her speaking voice," are a large part of her repertoire. Ironically, her birth name is far less exotic than her adopted stage name.

"I was born Terri Sue Feldshuh," she said. "Terri Sue is the Hebrew equivalent. My Christian boyfriend, Michael Fairchild, thought Tovah was so much more exotic and more beautiful and more womanly than Terri Sue. It was a bizarre change-of heart, and if I had to do it again, I'm not sure what I'd do. It probably have been better for me if I had done it in reverse, but I didn't.

People type-cast you, although they type-cast everybody. So I've had to buck up against that. Certain anti-Semitic embarrassment from Jews who don't want to be too Jewish. I know that sounds weird, but Jackie Mason jokes about that. But on the other hand, I'm having breakfast with the [Israeli] Prime Minister's [Yitzhak Rabin] wife tomorrow, and I don't know if that would have happened if my name was Terri Sue Feldshuh.

Smoke alert at the Court

Smokin' Joe Kubek and band debut CD at the Court Tavern

By WILLIAM WESTHOVEN WeekendPlus Editor learly, there will be no smoke-free environment Saturday at the Court Tavern in New Brunswick, where Rounder Records' Bullseye Blues label will throw a record release party for Texas Cadillac, the third CD by The Smokin' Joe Kubek Band featuring Bnois King.

Following the lead of fellow Texas bluesmen like Albert King, Freddie King and Kubek's friend Stevie Ray Vaughn, Kubek was a guitarist in Freddie King's band until King's death in 1976. Still only 19, Kubek struck out on his own, finally hooking up with King, a jazz guitarist and powerful vocalist in the Junior Parker and Otis Rush mold, in 1988.

The band, which includes bassist Gene Wright and drummer Jim Campbell, a former bandmate of Jimmie Vaughan, released its first CD for Bullseve. Steppin' Out, Texas Style in 1991. Chain Smokin Texas Style followed in 1992. Both received critical acclaim for their hard-driving, electric blues style as the band toured nonstop throughout the country.

Texas Cadillac helps to fill the void left by Stevie Ray Vaughan's death in 1990, and although neither guitarist measures up to Vaughan's impossible stand-





ard, they add an element Vaughn and Double Trouble never did — the interplay of two lead guitarists. "Mellow Down Easy" gets the album off to a fast start with its rolling beat and jazzy guitar, while Still A Fool is a bottom-heavy rocker driven by a John Lee Hooker boogie rhythm.

Texas Cadillac also touches on Memphis blues ("Seems Like a Million Years") and other styles, while other highlights include the bouncy "Show You What They See," the slow-burning "Mean Old World" and the title track. For good measure, they throw in a slow, slide guitar-dominated cover of Willie Dixon's "Little Red Rooster."


