### Demolition is under way on Fairmont Plaza ruins

A demolition crew this week began tearing down what's left of the Fairmont Park Plaza building destroyed by fire and a natural gas explosion more than remained standing, encircled by a chain link fence to four months ago.

Borough Construction Official John Allen said Tuesday the property's two landlords, Bill Mohylak were left standing, but they were determined structuring and foundation.

Work started Tuesday, he said.

Most of the building was consumed by the explosion and fire early Jan. 28. Officials said the blast was touched off by a corroded, leaking gas pipe inside Park Luncheonette.

The final school bell will ring for two South Plain- Notch. field educators June 30 at 4 p.m.

Anthony Sincavage, principal of John E. To those who know Mr.Sincavage and Mr. Lenahan, the simultaneous retirements do not seem coincidental.

### defends account Fund was OK'd in 1994 budget

Borough Council members, including Council President Dan Gallagher, approved the mayor's expense account, which some council Democrats labeled "secret" during a meeting last month, Mayor Michael Woskey said Monday. "He is correct," Mr. Gallagher said Tuesday. But even though

council approved the account, the line-item was never discussed with council members, or brought to their attention during meetings on the 1994 municipal budget, he added.

At the council's meeting May 26, Democrats accused the mayor of hiding the \$5,000 fund. Mr. Gallagher said at the meeting he hadn't known the account existed until that day, when he was told the cost of a luncheon with several high school students would come out of the account.

However, Mayor Woskey said Monday council members approved the expense account last year when they voted unanimously to adopt the 1994 budget. The account was established "to track" expenses related to the mayor's office and to separate those costs from other administrative expenses, Mr. Woskey said.

If council members were unaware of the item, it was not his fault, the mayor said. "It's their responsibility as council people to review every single line item in the budget and approve it," he said. "I can only assume they knew it was there. If they didn't agree with it back then, they should have pulled

But Mr. Gallagher maintained Tuesday the account was established "secretively."

"The line item was set up and I never saw it," he said. "I felt it should have been brought to [council members'] attention and discussed with us.'

A line-item copy of the borough's 1994 budget, dated Nov. 11, 1993 shows the account listed as "other expenses" under the mayor's of-fice. Other borough departments also have administrative expense accounts, Mr. Woskey said.

To date, only two charges have been posted to the account. One was the luncheon with members of the South Plainfield High School student government, at a cost of \$242.35, the mayor said. The other item was the cost of six plaques, a total of \$110.57. Since this month is the end of the 1994 fiscal year, the remaining money will go back into surplus for redistribution in next year's budget, Mr. Woskey said.

"We don't disagree with what he's doing with the money," Mr. Gallagher said. "We disagree with

his method." Although council members can refuse to pay any bill, they hesitate to do so in this case because "it will be perceived we were against what was done with the money,"

the councilman said. It will be up to the council to (Please turn to page A-2)

Borough Attorney Patrick Diegnan said the building and foundation will be demolished, and replaced with "clean fill."

Mr. Diegnan said the work is expected to be done within a month.





Tests pending on driver, truck in fatal By SYLVIE MULVANEY northbound lane, crossed the left lane and lay perpendicular to the lines, stretching THE REPORTER

Authorities investigating the Friday morning accident that killed a Franklin woman on Interstate 287 are awaiting results of tests done on the driver of the tractor trailer that crushed her car, and on the truck itself.

Spokesman for the New Jersey State Police, Trooper Al Della Fave, said Monday test results on the 18-wheeler and its driver, Ronald James, 47, of South Amboy, are expected

Cynthia Lerch, 34, of the Somerset section of Franklin, died of "multiple devastating injuries" after the tractor trailer overturned onto her 1992 Toyota Camry, Trooper Della Fave said. She was pronounced dead by Rosalyn Shulman of the Middlesex County Medical Examiner's Office at 10:36 a.m., just less than an hour after the accident was reported.

The trooper said the accident occurred in the southbound lanes after the tractor trailer, which Mr. James was driving in the center

grass median, and toppled onto Ms. Lerch's across at least two lanes. car when it reached the southbound lanes.

"Mr. James stated that he was cut off," Trooper Della Fave said.

That caused him to lose control of the tractor trailer loaded with wooden pallets, he said. It struck a guard rail before heading across the median.

The trooper said he would not know whether alcohol or drugs were involved until Mr. James' blood test results were revealed to-

He added that he didn't know whether the truck was speeding.

After the tractor trailer crushed the Toyota, it kept skidding across the lanes, sliding into a 1986 Chevy driven by Ozzie Caccavelli, 27, of Dey Street, Piscataway, the trooper said.

The driver of a fourth vehicle, Gregory Domanico, 20, of Hopatcong, couldn't stop his 1991 Hyundai in time, and hit the truck with his car, he said

When the tractor trailer came to a stop, it traffic to a crawl.

The occupants of all the vehicles were injured - including a passenger in Mr. Domanico's car - and taken to Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital in New Brunswick.

Mr. James was treated for a head injury and released. Mr. Domanico and his passenger, April Tesoriero, 21, of Succasunna, were treated for chest injuries and released, Trooper Della Fave said.

Mr. Caccavelli suffered chest injuries and was admitted to the hospital in good condition, he said. The Piscataway resident was released Monday.

Emergency personnel were on the scene 10:15 a.m.-2 p.m., the trooper said, and the highway's southbound lanes were closed between River and Possumtown roads.

The rerouting caused major backups heading south, and rubberneckers in the northbound lanes approaching the scene slowed

### The last lesson

### Grads can show maturity by not drinking and driving

The most difficult task facing the Class of 1994 is determining which of the cliches in graduation speeches are still valid.

Graduates will be told the ritual marks are not only an end, but a beginning as well. They will be told to work hard if they want to fulfill their boundless potential. Thanks will be given to parents, teachers, guidance counselors and cafeteria aides. All eyes will be focused on the limitless, far


Most graduates will take all these cliches with a grain of salt. They're far too busy celebrating to think about anything more serious in the future than this weekend at the shore. That's too bad because lost in all the hoopla will be a far more serious message - don't drink and drive.

No matter how many times the message is drummed into high school and college students, there will be some who will make the tragic and stupid mistake of driving under the influence of alcohol. Perhaps it is the triumphal arrogance of recent graduates that prompts the foolish and dangerous beliefs in immortality or immunity from the law. But alcohol doesn't care which lives it ruins. Drunken driving is an equal opportunity killer and there are far too many young lives ruined because someone gambles recklessly with the odds.

The responsibility to behave properly in graduation celebrations should be one of the first marks of maturity. Graduates need to be reminded that their education was meant to prepare them not as economic entities, but as responsible individuals in democratic societies. As citizens, they have the obligation to follow the laws which rule our society and to think about the consequences of their own acts. Driving under the influence of alcohol not only places the life of the driver in jeopardy, but it also endangers passengers and everyone on the road. The graduate, with four years of learning in either high school or college, should know that it's not a risk worth taking.

With this winter's bad weather postponing high school graduations until the end of the month, there's bound to be a lot of parties for the remainder of June. And, despite the state's legal drinking age of 21, there will be alcohol at some of these parties. Parents must realize they have the responsibility to supervise these parties, making sure that alcohol is not a welcome guest. In most towns, Project Graduation celebrations are providing a fun and safe alternative to the beer blasts of the past; these efforts should be supported by all members of the community. And seniors must exercise the maturity and peer leadership to reject alcohol as an acceptable stimulant for sociability.

However, with all these pressures coming to bear, it still boils down to the individual who has to balance that one final equation in the algebra of life: does the one drink for the road equal a lifetime of sorrow or no life at all?

It is almost hard to believe that it has been a whole year since I wrote my last letter to this paper deriding the small town ignorance displayed in South Plainfield by some members of the community.

However, it seems that my words were either ignored, overlooked, or, more likely, not understood. Needless to say, I was shocked that my commentary was not replied to in any subsequent issues of The Reporter, but considering that we live in an age of such great apathy, I should have anti-cipated such. Yet, after attending a meeting of the Board of Education and the Borough Council on Thursday, May 5, I feel it is direly necessary that I write to you, the taxpaying citizens of South Plainfield, concerning the embarrass-ment I have for this town after experiencing such a public fiasco.

I could easily wax critical for at least 40 pages on the meeting, since it lasted approximately four hours. But I will limit my criticisms to what I believe to be not only embarrassing, but detrimental to the well-being of the future of South Plainfield.

First of all, there could not have been more than 20 people in attendance at the hearing, and I would say that 80 percent of the audience was composed of senior citizens. That does not say too much for the parents of the children who attend South Plainfield public schools. On the same note, I often wonder if people realize that there are Board of Education members who do not even have children in the system. The Board of Education is not a business, but a responsibility, a responsibility borne by board members to see that the children of South Plainfield are educated sufficiently enough to lead productive lives for themselves and the community.

The meeting I attended seemed more like a forum for board members to evince flagging budgeting skills fueled by large egos based on what they say is "years of experience." However, I must say that in this high-speed, high-tech world, years of experience, especially the experience of the board members who are now retired, means absolutely nothing. How can the board expect to properly fund the training of the borough's children when they themselves have not been trained either? I would say it is time for citizens who are properly trained in the computer and technical fields to rise up and seize the reins of the Board of Education for your children's sake. It is true that technical consultants can help, but is their best interest vested in the children of South Plainfield or in their own reputations, vanities, and bank accounts?

My next criticism has to do with how some Borough Council members approached this session. I attended this meeting under the illusion that it would be a forum where the two municipal bodies would vent their respective feelings on budget cutting; I did not want or expect a line-item review of the Board of Education budget. The only debate that should have occurred was the debate on when to have the next meeting in which the board would present a budget to the council that weighed about \$2.5 million less. Nevertheless, rather than make suggestions on how and/or where to cut the budget, council members, especially Councilman [Ed] Kubala, wasted an extraordinary amount of time, energy, and hot air in demanding to know where every penny is spent on paltry expenses.

Allow me to give the Borough Council a word of advice, I have spent the past three years serving on the student activities budget committee at Fordham University in New York and am presently the senior member of the committee, and though our budget is only \$240,000, the rules for budgeting



### Roosevelt pupils fish for ocean lessons

Students in Ms. Pendzuk's fourth-grade class at Roosevelt School have been studying ocean life. 

Chevrolet's Lumina minivan offers sedan-like luxury and plenty of cargo space and, this year, new styling.

### Lumina highlights luxury in a spacious minivan

By TOM HAGIN

FORBES NEWSPAPERS

When General Motors introduced the Chevrolet Lumina Minivan in 1990, it entered a highly competitive niche with a seats removed. vehicle design that was seen as both futuristic and controversial. Its debut also gave the company a refined, car-like machine that offered front-wheel drive for good traction, easy drivability and plenty of space. It also provided a product for two offer the design as the Silhouette and the Transport, respectively.

In this market segment, the competition is fierce and, although first-year sales figures (63,141 units sold) haven't been surpassed, its sustained presence is evidence of its popularity. It appeals to buyers who need passenger and cargo carrying ability, but want sedan-like qualities of comfort.

#### **EXTERIOR**

Lumina's sharply raked nose and windscreen contribute to a slippery shape and offer a modern and distinctive profile. Below the leading edge of the front cladding and continues to form the rear bumper. Extensive use of reinforced plastic on its body panels offers rust-free and dent-resistant longevity. The polycompound is strengthened with fiberglas which absorbs minor impacts without scarring. Chevrolet is so confident with their use of this space-age material that no protective molding is necessary, giving a clean, flush view of Lumina's side. Our test vehicle came equipped with new "directional" aluminum wheels and the '94 version also enjoys a slightly shorter nose, new paint and other minor exterior styling changes.

#### INTERIOR

Our Lumina had comfortable front bucket seats and a unique powered side door, made inoperable unless the transmission is in "park." Seating aft of the driver comes in either the standard fivepassenger configuration, or as an optional seven-seater with an extra chair added to the middle row. We utilized the AM/FM CD player and really became accustomed to its cruise control, power windows, mirrors, driver's seat and door locks. Loading ous to list but, suffice it to say, the only cargo inside is easy as each rear seat item missing was the kitchen sink.

weighs only 32 pounds and requires no tools for removal. A handy luggage net keeps groceries from tipping over and maximum cargo area for the Lumina minivan is almost 113 cubic feet with the rear

#### **ENGINEERING**

Power comes from either the standard 3.1-liter, 120-horse V6, or the 3.8-liter V6 which GM is using in many of its products for 1994. With 170 horsepower and 225 sibling companies: Oldsmobile and Pontiac foot-pounds of torque, the 3.8 lets the machine jump into traffic and cruise easily with today's faster pace. Equipped with the optional trailering package, it can tow up to 3,000 pounds. Power rack-and-pinion steering turns only three times lock-tolock, enabling the Lumina minivan to circle in 43 feet.

#### HANDLING

From the cockpit, it's difficult to tell where the nose ends as the massive flat plain of the dashboard extends from the instrument cluster to the base of the 17square-foot windshield. The van is nimble, bumper is a curved intake scoop which although some aftermarket rubber with a wraps smoothly around to lower body-side wider footprint would make for grippier, more precise maneuvering. We found a well-balanced, sedan-like ride and a smooth electronic four-speed automatic transmission which made the combination an easy one to drive around town. A new power sliding side door makes loading cargo simple.

#### SAFETY

All Lumina minivans come equipped with anti-lock brakes for excellent steering control on slippery surfaces during heavy braking. Also standard is a driver's side airbag. Our van featured optional integrated child seats, for use by children between 20-40 pounds, while all Luminas use a steel "cage" to protect occupants including side-intrusion beams in the doors. Automatic door locks engage when the shifter is pulled from Park.





### When a 'hot' car isn't cool

Can you explain what it is and if it's legitimate? I don't want to start World War III on this, but I also have a phobia about being overcharged. You can stop construction

on your bomb shelter: bending the I-beams on a Ford truck chassis is the accepted camber adjustment procedure. The front suspension on these vehicles is labeled Twin I-Beam and is, in effect, two solid front axles (wheels directly linked together) with one left spindle and one right spindle cut off and replaced by pivot ment is a gamble, but lots points. Camber (outward top tilt of the wheels when viewed from the front) can only be "adjusted" by the somewhat crude method of bending the offending I-beam into the correct number of alignment degrees. I always hated doing alignments on these vehicles since the amount of bending is imprecise at best and a gamble at worst.

We have a 1984 Chevrolet Camaro 4.3-liter V6 with 116,000 miles and a fivespeed transmission. It started ago, but I couldn't tell where it was going. It got hot once so that the warning light came on. We stopped and let it cool, then showed up in the oil. One mechanic tells me that it has a cracked head, while another tells me that it's a problem in the intake manifold gasket. He said that this gasket goes this car is long overdue. This car has iron cylinder heads and an

aluminum intake manifold.

Never hesitate when a car problem shows up. If you haven't corrected your problem by now, better get the car off the road until you do, or you may wind up with even more trouble. It's quite possible that the intake manifold gasket is the culprit. The iron heads expand at different rates and eventually this can lead to a shearing of the gasket that seals them. Since there are water passages between the cylinder heads and the intake manifold, this shearing can cause a coolant leak into the motor oil system. Some of the coolant will be lost through the positive crankcase ventilation system but most will remain in the pan. The best bet is to have the intake manifold gasket replaced right away and hope that the heads or block aren't cracked. The only accurate check is a complete tear-down and inspection. A manifold gasket replace-

I recently saw a television news story that showed a family that had bought a used Honda at an unbelievably good price only to find that the car was really the front of one wrecked car that had been cut off and welded to the rear of another that had also been wrecked but at the opposite end. Isn't it illegal to do this? How can a buyer protect herself from buying a wreck that had been fixed this way?

If an unscrupulous shop Abuys two similar wrecks and gets a "clean" ownership certificate on one, it gives using coolant about four months the shop legal ownership of one good car. 





### For these folks, a car means business and recreation

To most motorists around the world, the automobile is simply a means of transportation - a household appliance that's mobile and useful. Sure, it's an item of individual pride and family adoration when it's new and shiny but that wears off in a few months, especially after it's acquired a couple of door-dings or other minor abrasions. But there's a huge body of automobilists to whom the daily-driven and "streetable" vehicle is not only transportation but a means of recreation and excitement. To these folks, getting out for a Sunday drive might take the form of grinding through boulder-strewn gullies or speeding to the limits of adhesion around rubber cones or cruising to unexplored campsites. Sometimes these ventures can encompass more than one of these venues. I've had experience with most of them and categorize

#### OFF-ROAD

One of my students owns a somewhat vintage Ford Bronco that's his pride and joy. He drives it to school daily but enjoys nothing so much as taking it to an off-road recreation park where, for a fee, drivers of these vehicles can test their skills against frame-twisting ravines, almost-impossible grades and axle-deep mud. It's the kind of terrain that today's sports/utility vehicles are ostensibly built for, but few encounter.

**AUTOCROSS** Every weekend, you'll see these enthusiasts buzzing around rubber cones in surface and without the snow. The speeds skill is at a premium. While many of these slalom drivers participate in special- purpose machines that must be trailered to the events, the great majority of them participate their everyday vehicles that may or may not be "tweaked" for better performance and handling. To pragmatically justify it's existence, I classify autocrossing as Accident Avoidance Training.

#### CONCOURS D'ELEGANCE

There's a hard-core cadre of participants in these elegant auto shows that display exotic and or ancient vehicles that are never used for trips to the supermarket. But the vast majority of those cars on display are licensed for the street and, while they aren't used for transporting bags of manure for the garden or to chauffeur the Little League team, they are more or less

practical for occasional transportation. You can spot them in local parking lots: they're the immaculate cars that are parked in remote and isolated areas far from the slings and arrows of inconsiderate fellow parkers.

STREET ROD

Suddenly, it's 1950. The vehicle that passes you is a hot-rod straight out of a vintage teenager movie. A body made in the late '20s or early '30s; a V8 engine that sparkles with chrome; rear tires that are almost as wide as they are tall. This oldtime classic street rod was probably built from scratch from a plethora of new parts that are available through an industry that exists for enthusiasts who want to enjoy an automotive era that may have passed before they were born.

#### KIT CAR

Maybe its not a classic '32 Ford high-boy street rod that passes you. Maybe it's a European exotic that rolls by but issues a rumble that sounds very much like a fullhouse Chevy or Ford V8. Kit cars are usually home-built from kits, of course, and the resulting vehicle may look like a Ferrari or Lamborghini, an AC Cobra or early Corvette, a '50 MG TD or '36 Auburn Speedster. Many of the kits that are sold are never completed but those that are finished show the results of countless hours of tedious, loving assembly. They're not necessarily show cars but their owners like nothing better than to show them off to admiring strangers.

#### RECREATION VEHICLE

A feature on vehicular pleasures would be incomplete without a reference to that parking lots all over the country. It's a lot all-American icon, the RV. While their prelike downhill skiing with a car, on a flat ordained purpose is to provide home-like lodging while on the road, there's few don't get over 70 mph at best and driving RVers that don't view their rolling cottages with the same degree of affection as a street-rodder or a kit car builder. Indeed, many enthusiasts of other disciplines are RV owners as well. ## Summer's concert headquarters

There's something for everyone at the open-air Garden State Arts Center

xperienced concert-goers know that it's not just the bands, but the location that makes for a memorable concert experience. Yet while nearly every major concert is reviewed in the newspapers, the venues are rarely afforded the same treat-

So it seemed a good idea. with the summer season now upon us. to take a close look at New Jersev's summer concert headquarters, the Garden State Arts Center.


The GSAC, however, is a lot more than an open-air theater that hosts nearly every major concert tour - the notable exceptions being stadium extravaganzas like Pink Floyd, the Eagles and the piano tag-team of Billy Joel and

Elton John - of the busy summer season. Owned an operated by the New Jersey Highway Authority, the same folks who operate the Garden State Parkway as an autonomous agency, the GSAC annually stages free concerts for the public and also hosts an annual series of popular ethnic

"Our mission is to provide entertainment that will satisfy a variety of tastes," said director of marketing and publicity Barbara Movelle. "That's why you see classical, jazz and children's concerts in addition to rock and pop.

True to its word, the GSAC, an open-air amphitheater with about 5,000 seats under its saucer-shaped roof and room for more than 5,000 more on the surrounding lawn, books everything from heavy metal heroes like Metallica (see review below) and alternative favorites like Depeche Mode and Phish to new age (Yanni), adult contemporary (including an annual appearance by New Jersey favorite son Frank Sinatra), classical (the New Jersey Symphony performs both on its own and with other artists like Paul Anka and the Moody Blues) and classic rockers like Steve Miller and Santana.

And each year, several artists, including Janet Jackson this year, perform benefit shows for the Garden State Arts Center Foundation, which uses the funds to stage free

concerts, mostly for children and senior citizens.

Several of the free shows, featuring the New Jersey Pops Orchestra, Al Martino and Kay Starr, have already taken place, although several of the children's shows, including a live productions of Curious George (Sept. 20), Aladdin (Sept. 22) and The Wizard of Oz (Sept. 23) are still in the offing.

Heritage festivals in the spring and fall include the Polish Festival with Jan Lewan (which took place last weekend), Saturday's Festa Italiana and Sunday's Jewish Festival of the Arts with Jan Murray (see complete schedule on right).

While the N.J. Highway authority is not a non-profit organization, it does not look on concert promotion as a forprofit business venture. They are, however, one of the more successful operations in a very risky business, where poor ticket sales or bad weather can put an investor our of business in a hurry.

"We have shown a substantial and steady increase in ticket sales over the years," said Movelle.

The reasons?

"It's a beautiful facility, and I think being out-of-doors makes a big difference. It's much more calming and enjoyable than being inside," Movelle said. "And we run a very efficient operation. The artists we book are of substantial quality, and we are centrally located within the state, so it's easy to get to."

"It's also easier to get in and out of the parking lot, and while ticket prices sometimes run a little more than other locations, there is no charge for parking."

Ticket prices are not set by us, they are a direct result of the artists [fees]," said Movelle. "You have to look at how many tickets we can sell, and most amphitheaters being built these days are built to hold 18-25,000 people (festival venues can hold even more). As for parking, we've talked about it [charging a fee], but we've never done it before, and we'd like to keep it that way.

The GSAC has also instituded a new policy this year that allows offers half-price ticket sales for classical concerts on the day of the show. Special dinner-theater packages for other selected shows (including dinner at the adjacent Rob ert B. Meyner Reception Center and reserved parking) are also available (cocktails are served at the Meyner Center before every show).

## Arts Center staff proves its mettle at Metallica concert

ne thing was for sure on June 1, when the Garden State Arts Center opened its summer concert season with the head-banging triple bill of Metallica, Danzig and Suicidal Tendencies: if the GSAC staff could get survive this acid test, it would be smooth sailing right through Labor Day.

And while the capacity crowd (the show sold out instantly and is still the only GSAC sellout to date) was indeed, as advertised, rowdy and raucous, it was not the convention of depravity that many - especially after reports of trouble at the tour's previous engagement in Buffalo - had feared. Part of the credit goes to the kids, whose seemingly violent moshing and posing is so often

misunderstood, but even more credit goes to the security staff of the GSAC, whose grace under fire defused many touchy situations before they got out of hand.

Yes, there were a few fights, including one donnybrook between two bulky metalheads that nearly crashed into the expensive lighting board, but I didn't see anyone seriously hurt. More importantly, even when fists were whistling by their ears, not a single security man or woman resorted to blows. In fact, the aforementioned heavyweight bout drew nearly a dozen security men into the fray, and despite the chaos, they had the presence of mind to allow the girlfriend of one of the fighters to calm him down. Second later, the fighters were joking with security as both parties breathed a sigh of relief.

The worst thing that happened was a group of dorks on the center lawn who started a bonfire (using programs for tinder, it grew as others came over to toss their programs in), and then started moshing through it. When two security guards, one with a fire extinguisher, doused the flames, they got caught up in the moshing, and at least one participant was turned over to the state troopers, who wisely remained outside. where their presence was visible, but not

I mention these incidents not to scare anyone, but to merely stress that while many venues have seen Metallica concerts regress into anarchy, the GSAC had the guts to book the show (kids, take note: a lot of places won't book them, so show some appreciation next time and chill out) and

the savvy to pull it off without major incident. And if they can handle this, they can handle anything.

What about the music, you say? Well, as metal concerts go, it was a lot of bang for the buck. Suicidal Tendencies preached their curious gospel ("if you have the guts to believe in yourself and be the best person you can be, that's what we call being Suicidal") over a screaming speed-metal drone. Danzig slowed things down a bit with their plodding roar, weighed down even more by the mock posing of beefy singer Glenn Danzig, and Metallica, the kingpins of modern metal, whipped the crowd into a fistpumping frenzy.

As for the security force: kudos for a job well-done. Hopefully, you can catch up on your rest during the Air Supply concert.

## **Penny** ante

Penny Marshall's streak ends with 'Renaissance Man'

By JEFFREY COHEN WeekendPlus Film Critic lot of people think that Penny Marshall's first film as a director was Big. Sorry. Before that, Marshall dragged Whoopi Goldberg through an extremely forgettable action comedy called Jumpin' Jack Flash. It's important to remember that

while considering Marshall's newest film, Renaissance Man, which breaks her long creative winning streak that lasted through Awakenings and A League of Their Own. This movie isn't bad, exactly, it's just so disposable that you won't remember one joke a week after you see it. Not one. Unless they continue to show the commercials on television.

This is movie making, sitcom division: Danny DeVito, who should know better, is an unemployed ad man who, in a series of circumstances that don't make any sense, ends up teaching some flunk-out Army recruits about English literature, specifically Hamlet. It is a measure of the movie's originality that when the title is first mentioned, someone thinks it refers to "a little bitty pig."

Bill Rago (DeVito) is quick with a wisecrack, and that's about it. He has no qualifications as a teacher or an inspiration, which makes him perfect for the Army's program to teach eight recruits "how to comprehend." It's never made any clearer than that exactly what Bill's mission is, and since the recruits are never seen messing up in any major way, it's hard to tel exactly how these eight were identified.

The recruits are a casting director's dream, the ethnically diverse group of stereotypes masquerading as characters. There's the New Yawker, doing endless DeNiro impressions, the obnoxious-butmisunderstood cracker (rapper Marky Mark, of all people), the jive-

talking city kid (Kadeem Hardison, looking really upset that A Different World has been canceled), etc. Nobody ever makes much of an impression, and when we're called upon to care about these people individually and collectively, it's

Marshall's usual struggle between hard-edged comedy and drippy sentimentality is more obvious than usual, and she clearly isn't reigning in the big emotions as well as usual. Where Big, for example, managed to give us a heart-tug at the end, it did so honestly. Here, we're supposed to muster up enthusiasm for people who never register beyond the sketch for the inevitable TV series based on this film, in which the characters will, no doubt, be more fully explored.

DeVito does what he can, but in this case he's handcuffed by the movie's insistence that he be an intelligent, sensitive family man on the one hand (he just happens

to be reading Hamlet when the class notices), and on the other, a jerk who won't indulge his daughter's passion for astronomy because there's no money in it.

And the movie is full of dialogue (courtesy of Jim Burnstein's screenplay, which is billed as "semi-autobiographical") with absolutely no subtlety whatsoever. When Bill takes his daughter to a Tigers game and they argue about her stargazing, he tries to make amends by buying her a pennant. "Don't you want your pennant?" he asks, and she replies, 'no, I just want you to believe in me!" If only life were that clear.

Gregory Hines appears, occasionally, as the tough drill sergeant who thinks Bill's class is beneath the dignity of the Army. The supporting cast also includes James Remar, for once not a snarling villain, as the captain who can't make up his mind about anything, and Cliff Robertson as the base commander, who seems to have a point, but it's hiding somewhere behind all the Shakespeare.

If you've been dying to see Dead Poets Society meets Private Benjamin, this is just the movie for you. If, however, you were hoping for more from Marshall, DeVito and company, you might find Renaissance Man a little overlong, a little sexist (All the women, surprisingly enough, are superfluous) and a lot predictable. A lot. If you've seen the coming attractions trailer, you've seen this movie.

# Vacation video

Hot kidvid titles for the long, hot summer

obody loves home video
more than children.

And since children are
home from school during
the summer months, this is one of
the best times of the year for children's video (or "kidvid," as the
industry would have it).

But are all kidvid tapes created equal? Of course not. As Disney recently proved by releasing Return to Jafar as a sequel to Aladdin, even the same company can have a wide range of quality in these areas. And so, for the discerning kid's video customer, here is a buyer's guide to the recent and coming releases.

(A note: WeekendPlus film/video critic Jeffrey Cohen, believing that the best judge of a children's video title, is, in fact, a child, has asked his son, Joshua, almost 5, to add his comments (in italics).

Not having squeezed quite enough money out of the video market yet this year. Disney recently released two titles in a new video line: Mickey's Fun Songs, which consist of live-action figures with some extremely theatrical kids to sing a lot of songs that Disney doesn't have to pay royalties on. These two titles, Campout at Walt Disney World (a long commercial for a certain theme park) and Let's Go to the Circus!, therefore, include kids singing such child favorites as "The Man on the Flying Trapeze" and "Don't Fence Me In." Go figure.

I don't like the circus one, but the campout one is fun. I like to sing "valderee, valdera." (Now available, \$12.99 each.)

Coming from the big screen to the small one is **Batman: Mask of the Phantasm**, which actually started out on the small screen. It's a feature-length film based on the animated series. Adults might actually find it somewhat interesting, and little kids might find it a little scary, but for the 5-to-8 set, there's little that will be as well-received, at least until the Mighty Morphin Power Rangers make their inevitable big-screen debut.

I'll be Batman, and you be the Joker, or the Catwoman, or ... wait. Can Batman fly? Which one is this? (Now available: \$19.96.)

Continuing a series it began successfully last year, the Disney company gives toddlers more of their only video hero, the lift-the-flat pooch **Spot**, who in this installment **Goes to a Party**. It's more of the same, but try telling that to my 18-month-old daughter Eve, who merely points at the screen for a half-hour a day and yells "Bot! Bot!"

Can I watch a tape when Evie's done watching Spot? (Now available: \$12.99.)

If you don't get Showtime, you may not know about **Shelley Duvall's Bedtime Stories**, a delightful series in which the actress-

turned-producer introduces cleverly-animated versions of classic children's books, narrated by very famous people. In the latest installment (two stories per tape), Steve Martin, Morgan Freeman, Richard Dreyfuss and Candice Bergen read stories about Moe the dog, Amos the dog, a mouse who gets into a lot of trouble and a penguin with a taste for tales.


Moe the dog goes to a tropical paradise, which is where all the sand is. And the mouse wants to be an outlaw, but he gets into lots of trouble! Can I see this one again? (Universal, June 29; \$12.98 each.)

Coming to your video screen almost direct from the theaters is **Thumbelina**, the latest nail in Don Bluth's animated coffin. The man who gave you *The Land Before Time* and *An American Tail* is here trying to tell Hans Christian Anderson's classic fable with the help of Charo, who plays a toad, and Barry Manilow, who co-wrote all the songs. All we can report is it went no place in the theaters very quickly.

I don't think I wan't to watch Thumbelina. I don't like frogs. (Warner, July 26; \$24.96.)

But that's not all that's on the way for kids. Beethoven's Second, which took a lot of heat for all its romantic interludes (kids thought it slowed down the comedy) is due on video August 9, at a price of \$24.98. Disney is releasing two new Muppet Classic Theater titles August 12, at \$22.99 each.

And further down the line, look for **The Night-mare Before Christmas**, the Tim Burton stopmotion hit, on September 30, for \$19.99; and the grandmother of them all, **Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs** (available Oct. 28; \$26.99). Signs reminding you to pre-order are already up in the malls.

## **Comedy stage**

## Ladies night out

Impressionist Marilyn Michaels and 'friends' coming to Metuchen

he Forum Theatre stage is large enough to scare off just about any entertainer who does a solo show.

But not actress/singer/comedienne Marilyn Michaels. who will be at the Metuchen stage to perform there Sunday afternoon (note: previously scheduled Saturday show was cancelled). After all, when you book her, you also book Judy Garland, Barbara Streisand, Liz Taylor and several other celebrities that she is famous for impersonating.

Accompanied only by her pianist and musical director, Barry Levin, the show, titled "Night of 101 Stars," is expected to draw a large audience at the Forum, which rarely books such one-nighters.

Her youthful appearance would give the impression of a relatively new performer, but older fans will remember seeing her on the old Ed Sullivan Show.

"I did the last Sullivan special." she said during a recent phone interview. "I've been at this all my life, since I was 7 years old, and now I'm 40-uhhh ... I've

been at this a long time."

Age specifics notwithstanding, Michaels should be quite happy with where her career path has led her, including her recent Broadway debut in the hit comedy revue Catskills on Broadway, which featured a number of longtime standup comedians pooling their talents. According to Michaels, who won an Outer Critics Circle Award for her efforts, Catskills was successful because it gave audiences something different than the typically heavy Broadway fare.

"I think that having good-time comedy is always overdue," she said. "People want to be entertained. They want to forget their problems. Everybody has some-

thing going on and they want to get away from it. They want to have a good time, and that's what my show is about. Having people come, and enjoy, and walk out with a smile on their face.

Unlike TV, where she often does impressions in costume, the Forum show moves too quickly for her to change costumes and makeup, so the impressions rely more on her ability as an actress ("It's more like Lily Tomlin," she offered as a reference). The show also features other treats, including a "switching channels" segment where she "channel surfs" up and down the dial, and some new impressions, including Brooke Shields, Roseanne Arnold and Cher.





## Royal treatment

Raagini's is serving up delicious Indian cuisine in Mountainside

aagini is a Hindi word meaning many different things, said co-owner Harmesh Mittal, who operates the new fine dining Indian restaurant in Mountainside with his manager, Sanjay Gupta.

"Classical Indian melody," or "most beautiful woman with poise, elegance, power, valor and kindness" are two definitions offered. the latter being a tribute to colorful women in Indian history as opposed to men.

"We chose to do it differently." said Mr. Mittal who explained that most Indian restaurants are named after colorful men in history. "I don't like to follow the runof-the-mill."

At Raagini, you will see Mr. Mittal and Mr. Gupta have done it differently. The first thing you notice is the glass-enclosed Tandoor "kitchen" where you can watch Chef K. Bakshi bake naan, the traditional Indian bread, in the clay ovens.

Just opened in May, the 130-seat restaurant is extravagantly laid out. Traditional colored-glass lanterns hang from tall ceilings, tables donning deep red tablecloths accent the traditional Indian colors of purple, red. sea green and orange seen in the carpet and details throughout the restaurant.

As with the blend of colors and culture, Raagini's menu lists classical dishes which are meant to be mixed and shared - the traditional Indian style of eating. Appetizers (\$3.95-8.95), such as the vegetable samosa, crisp pastry filled with potatoes, peas and fresh spices and the pakoras, fritters of vegetables or cheese, are served warm on an angithi

Raagini's recipe for Murgh-e-Makhani (or "Chicken Delight")

Ingredients (for six)

•3 lbs. boneless, skinned chicken •1 T. plain yogurt •1 tsp. salt •1 T. lemon juice •1/2 tsp. garam masala (available in Indian food stores) •1 cup cream •1/2 cup tomato paste •2 T. ginger-garlic paste •another ½ tsp. salt •coriander leaves and sliced almonds for gamish

Preparation:

Mix yogurt, lemon juice, 1 tsp. salt and masala. Cut chicken into pieces and marinate for one hour. Skewer chicken and grill for about 10 minutes or until done. In a pan combine cream, tomato paste, ginger-garlic paste and 1/2 tsp. salt. Cook over medium heat for about 5 minutes. Add chicken. Cook another 5 minutes. Gamish with coriander leaves and chopped almonds.




